Get to know your Bible

The Bible is like a library made up of 66 books written by many different people over many years.

The Old Testament books were written before Jesus was born. They are the holy stories he would have grown up hearing and reading. There are 39 of these.

The New Testament tells us the stories of Jesus and his followers. There are 27 books in the


New Testament.

Bible context: Genesis

The book of Genesis was written around 1430 BC; Moses is believed to be the author. It is the first book in the Bible and covers a span of 2,000 years. The book tells the stories of how the world was made and the stories of the first people. Genesis is a book of two halves. The first half (chapters 1-12) tells the stories of all that happened before Abraham, including creation, the flood, and the Tower of Babel. The second half (chapters 12-50) tells the stories of the people who would become the start of the nation of Israel, including Abraham, Jacob, and his son Joseph.

In this story we see what happens when family relationships struggle.

The Story: Genesis 37 verses 2-28 (The International Children's Bible)

Joseph was a young man, 17 years old. He and his brothers cared for the flocks. His brothers were the sons of Bilhah and Zilpah, his father's wives. Joseph gave his father bad reports about his brothers. Joseph was born when his father Israel, also called Jacob, was old. So Israel loved Joseph more than his other sons. He made Joseph a special robe with long sleeves. Joseph's brothers saw that their father loved Joseph more than he loved them. So they hated their brother and could not speak to him politely.

One time Joseph had a dream. When he told his brothers about it, they hated him even more. Joseph said, "Listen to the dream I had. We were in the field tying bundles of wheat together. My bundle stood up, and your bundles of wheat gathered around mine. Your bundles bowed down to mine."

His brothers said, "Do you really think you will be king over us? Do you truly think you will rule over us?" His brothers hated him even more now. They hated him because of his dreams and what he had said.

Then Joseph had another dream. He told his brothers about it also. He said, "Listen, I had another dream. I saw the sun, moon and 11 stars bowing down to me."

Joseph also told his father about this dream. But his father scolded him, saying, "What kind of dream is this? Do you really believe that your mother, your brothers and I will bow down to you?" Joseph's brothers were jealous of him. But his father thought about what all these things could mean.

One day Joseph's brothers went to Shechem to herd their father's sheep. Jacob said to Joseph, "Go to Shechem. Your brothers are there herding the sheep."

Joseph answered, "I will go." His father said, "Go and see if your brothers and the sheep are all right. Then come back and tell me." So Joseph's father sent him from the Valley of Hebron.

When Joseph came to Shechem, a man found him wandering in the field. He asked Joseph, "What are you looking for?" Joseph answered, "I am looking for my brothers. Can you tell me where they are herding the sheep?"

The man said, "They have already gone. I heard them say they were going to Dothan." So Joseph went to find them.

Joseph's brothers saw him coming from far away. Before he reached them, they made a plan to kill him. They said to each other, "Here comes that dreamer. Let's kill him and throw his body into one of the wells. We can tell our father that a wild animal killed him. Then we will see what will become of his dreams."





But Reuben heard their plan and saved Joseph. He said, "Let's not kill him. Don't spill any blood. Throw him into this well here in the desert. But don't hurt him!" Reuben planned to save Joseph later and send him back to his father. So when Joseph came to his brothers, they pulled off his robe with long sleeves. Then they threw him into the well. It was empty. There was no water in it.


While Joseph was in the well, the brothers sat down to eat. When they looked up, they saw a group of Ishmaelites. They were traveling from Gilead to Egypt. Their camels were carrying spices, balm, and myrrh.

Then Judah said to his brothers, "What will we gain if we kill our brother and hide his death? Let's sell him to these Ishmaelites. Then we will not be guilty of killing our own brother. After all, he is our brother, our own flesh and blood." And the other brothers agreed. So when the Midianite traders came by, the brothers took Joseph out of the well. They sold him to the Ishmaelites for eight ounces of silver. And the Ishmaelites took him to Egypt.

Ideas to Retell/Explore the Story

Story exploration tool



A way to reflect on the story

You will need to draw a picture of a coat or piece of clothing - or you could use an actual old shirt etc. Then you could use crayons or felt tips, bits of coloured paper or fabric, and different textures e.g. pipe cleaners, material, ribbon wool, sweet wrappers, cut up recycled greetings cards or card packaging. If using an item of clothing, any material or fabric to decorate would be ideal and you could use safety pins to fasten them on.

Read the Bible passages below (look in your Bible or try the website biblegateway.com where you will need to put in the search bar Genesis 37: 2-3 for example, and select the International Children's Bible as the Bible version). You could look up one each day for six days or do them all at once.

When you read the verses, decide what feelings are being experienced by the characters. What colour would you use to express those feelings? Add the colour you think of to one aspect of your coat or clothing. An example may be jealous = green, anger= red, sadness = purple, but this is your own piece of work, so you choose how you wish to reflect your feelings in colour.



(The answer is Jealousy)






Table Top Discussions

Each day over a mealtime, have a quick conversation. Here are a few questions to get you going:

- I wonder why Joseph was Jacob's favourite? Do you think all families have favourites?
 What is it like for all those involved? Is it always a negative thing?
- Joseph was different from his brothers. Perhaps he was meant to be, perhaps he was never meant to fit in. What are your thoughts I wonder?
- Joseph's brothers wanted to kill him, but Reuben spoke up. I wonder why he did this. Can you think of times when you have stood up for someone who nobody else wanted around?
- In this story we see the impact of jealousy on relationships. What else damages a relationship?
- The story tells us that Jacob gave his son a special robe. We are told it had long sleeves but no mention of multi-colours, unlike in the musical version. What do you think was special about his robe? What outfit has made you feel special?
- o Can a broken relationship be mended? How?

Pray Together

Letting Go – Paint Splat Prayers

Life can be messy, and it certainly was for Joseph and his family. Joseph was full of pride for his splendid coat and the dream he had and he showed off to his brothers. The brothers were jealous and angry. Rather than letting go of the hurt, they allowed it to build up and they hurt each other in what they did and spoke. Sometimes we need to be able to let go of things that are hurting us and hurting others. This prayer activity helps us to think about letting go of things and keeping our hearts focussed on God.

You will need: A large sheet of paper

Something to cover the floor or table (this can be messy!)

Paint in different colours

Paintbrush



Making sure that you have the floor or table well covered, place the sheet of paper in the centre. Then take it in turns to dip your paint brush in the paint and, thinking of the things you need or want to let go of, flick the paint on to the paper. Using different colours, you can create your own bright coloured prayer picture.

Pray Together

Looking with Different Eyes

Joseph's brothers were jealous of him. We sometimes call jealousy the green-eyed monster. They got angry with Joseph when he told them about his dream. We sometimes say 'seeing red' with anger. Different colours can help us think about our different moods and how we see things.

You will need: A kitchen roll or toilet roll tube

Some coloured cellophane sweet wrappers or a plastic bag coloured with

permanent marker cut into circles.

An elastic band

No.

Think about how different colours make you feel and make some coloured circles on an old plastic bag or use sweet wrappers. Take each of the different colours in turn and, using the elastic band, fasten them to the end of the card tube. Look through the tube and use the different colours to help you think about your different feelings. For example, the green on the end of the tube might help you to think about things that make you jealous. When you have had time to think with the different colours, put a colour on the tube that makes you feel happy and look through the tube again. Ask God to help you see things differently and to change your jealous and angry thoughts to happy ones.

Pray Together


Box Prayers

You will need: A piece of paper, pens or pencils (each person has a different colour)



Draw some dots in lines and columns on the paper.

Take it in turns to draw a line between two of the dots. As you join up the boxes, whoever draws the line that closes the box can write or draw their prayer inside the box.



To Do Together...

Voice Changer

You will need: Cardboard tube

Backing parchment

Elastic band



What you do:

Cut out a circle of baking parchment which is bigger than the diameter of the tube and secure it to the tube using an elastic band. Decorate it if you wish.

Put the tube to your mouth without creating a tight seal. Speak into it, making different noises and loud and quiet sounds.



The wax paper vibrates and distorts the sounds you make.

Joseph's brothers were jealous and jealousy can distort the way you view other people, their actions and the things they say.









To Do Together...

Bejazzling and Camouflaging

You will need: An object or item of clothing

Some double-sided Sellotape or fabric glue

Some sequins or fabric in colours in a variety of colours

What you do:

Choose what you are going to be jazzle or camouflage and select the colours you need.

For bejazzling, decorate it with lots of sparkly sequins, or sew on buttons so that you stand out from the crowd.

For a camouflage effect, put bits of fabric of tissue paper on which match what you are wearing or your skin tone, or colour it like the background so that it does not stand out from the crowd.

Joseph stood out from his brothers which made them jealous. Some people like to stand out in a crowd. Others prefer to remain camouflaged and unnoticed. Everyone is different. I wonder which type of person you are - or maybe the answer depends on the situation and who you are with. Should you need to hide away who you really are, just so that you fit in?

















To Do Together...

Creating and making

You will need: Some felt shapes and a large rectangle of felt

You could use fuzzy felts if you have some

What you do:

Create something out of the ordinary. Take some shapes and place them on the felt; it could be some clothing shapes or something else you want the change to make different.

Using the smaller shapes, decorate it and maybe change it around. Once you are finished you can change it again.

Joseph stood out because of the clothing he wore, which was given to him by his father. It was a special, very snazzy cloak that wouldn't have been suitable for working in the fields or with the animals so it made him look different. Have fun playing with the felt shapes and see just how snazzy you can make it.

If you don't have any felt, you could always do something similar with shapes of coloured paper cut out of a magazine, but you might need to glue those in place if you want them to stay on.














Our Walking the Way Challenge this time is...

Everyday Faith:

We experience all sorts of feelings in our relationships with others — although hopefully you don't go as far as dropping someone in a well or selling them off to Egypt! Sometimes we need God to help us to deal with difficult situations in our family or friendships. This week, talk to God each day and ask for help to find the best way to make relationships stronger. It may mean saying sorry or forgiving someone for something, it may mean trying to be content with what you have instead of being jealous of someone else, it may mean seeking someone out and deliberately doing something fun together to get to know each other better.

Scrapbooking:

If you did the Bible reflection with the coloured coat, that would be a good thing to put in your scrapbook. Maybe you could make something similar to reflect your week too – how are YOU feeling each day? Thank God for the reasons you feel good and ask God to help you with the cause of the more negative feelings as you decorate your "fabulous coat".

Take it Further:

Joseph was different, he stood out from his brothers not only because his dad treated him differently, but also because he was a different character from the rest. But he was exactly who he was meant to be – and it proved it as you read on in his story. Think about the people you know who are different to most people. (It might even be you!) How can you make it easier for them to be themselves in a group instead of expecting them to change? How can you get to know them better? What skills, talents, characteristics has God given them that you can learn from?
