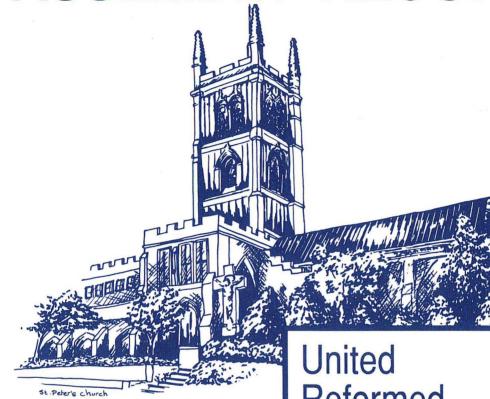

Sessions of the Assembly, from Tuesday to Friday, were presided over by the Moderator, except for part of the Faith and Life Department report, when the Revd Keith Forecast took the chair. Devotions at each session were led by the Moderator's Chaplains, Mrs Ruth Clarke, the Revd Alan Gaunt and the Revd John Hetherington.

Ministries Department

The Moderator welcomed newcomers to Assembly and called upon the Convener of the Ministries Department, the Revd Tony Burnham, to present the report of the Department. A printing error on p17, para.89, line 2, CCYC initials should read CCYW. Mr Burnham reported that the ministry appeal had reached £340,514.06 by 14 May and a further £7,000 had since been received. Assembly received the written report for debate.

After comments from the floor, the Revd Peter Brain was called upon to speak to Resolutions 2 to 8, which were formally moved. The written Resolutions 2 to 5

EMPLOYMENT PRACTICE

- The Assembly receives the Report on Employment Practice in the United Reformed Church in paragraphs 18-42 and Appendix 1of the book of Reports for debate.
- (a) The Assembly encourages the preparation of Pastorate Profiles and Personal Profiles to assist ministerial movements and commends the general use of the revised forms produced by the Ministries Department in this connection (revisions of Appendices A, B and C of the Report).
 - (b) The Assembly recognises in Note A (paragraph 2.2.5 of the Report revised) summary of the best current practice for declaring a ministerial vacancy and encourages its general adoption.
 - (c) The Assembly recognises in Note B (paragraph 2.3.5 of the Report revised) a statement of best current practice which could form the basis for locally agreed procedure in the filling of vacancies.
- 4 (a) The Assembly encourages District Councils to keep their requirement for and deployment of ministers under review.
 - (b) Assembly authorises District Councils to re-negotiate the scoping of pastorates at a time other than during a vacancy and urges that this right be spelt out when concurring with all future calls.
- The Assembly instructs District Councils to designate an appropriate person or committee to examine annually the level of ministerial expenses being paid by pastorates and to address any apparent problems.

were approved.

The Resolution

- 6. (a) The Assembly encourages District Councils to make available ministerial help (e.g. a temporary colleague) for a pregnant minister.
 - (b) The Assembly instructs District Councils to start discussions with the pastorate and the minister within Sweeks of the birth in cases

where consideration may need to be given to rescoping the pastorate, and to conclude such negotiations within 26 weeks.

was amended by the addition of the word *following* the birth after 8 weeks, instead of of the birth and was then approved.

Amendments to the wording of Assembly Reports, page 10, Note C, nos. 4 and 5 were proposed by the Revd Mark Piper and seconded by Mrs Margaret Carrick-Smith. In para. 4 the words *for example* to be inserted after *possible barriers*; and in para. 5 delete the words *women and black people* and the paragraph amended to read:

5. The Church will therefore establish appropriate methods of monitoring the appointment, call and position in the ministry and other posts, with a view to overcoming negative discrimination and of considering appropriate action where necessary.

The amendment to para.4 was put to the vote, was carried and thus reads:

4. The Church is aware of possible barriers for example to women and to black people within the structures of the Church in ministry and other posts; this has to do with expectations, position, role and status.

The amendment to para. 5 was lost and it therefore stands:

5. The Church will therefore establish appropriate methods of monitoring the appointment, call and position of women and black people in the ministry and of considering appropriate action where necessary.

The Resolution:

EQUAL OPPORTUNITIES

7. The Assembly adopts the statement A Declaration of Equal Opportunities policy at Note C (a revision of Appendix E of the Report).

was passed by a large majority.

The Resolution:

GRIEVANCE PROCEDURE

8. The Assembly commends the grievance procedure set out in Note D (a revision of paragraph 4.7.2 of the Report) for use in appropriate cases.

was approved.

The Resolution:

Assessment Procedures for Ministerial Candidates

9. The Assembly authorises the Vocations Committee to revise the assessment procedure for ministerial candidates in accordance with paragraphs 59-64 of the book of Reports with effect from 1st January 1991 for a trial period of not more than 5 years, and calls for a report in 1994.

was moved by the Revd Michael Stolton. An amendment was proposed by Mrs Anne Oliver to para. 64, line 5 (p13 of Reports) following the words Assessment Conference to insert All candidates should receive written guidance on assessment and appeals

procedures. This was seconded by the Revd C Knight. The amendment was resisted by the committee. The amendment was carried and the paragraph thus reads:

64. Under this suggested procedure the District Council, after consultation with the District Pastoral Committee (or its equivalent) and the local church, would pass a recommendation to the Province. Province would then be responsible for deciding whether or not a positive recommendation could be forwarded to the National Assessment Conference. All candidates should receive written guidance on assessment and appeals procedures. Any candidate who does not receive consent to proceed beyond the Provincial stage would, however, be given opportunity to attend the National Conference should that be agreed, on the basis of appeal within the Province. Should there still be disagreement once all the processes outlined above have been completed, further negotiations would take place to reach a common mind. The Provincial Synod would then be asked to ratify the decision taken through the whole consultative procedure.

The Revd Michael Stolton responded to comments. The Revd Alasdair Pratt moved that this Resolution be deferred. This was seconded and the motion was put to the vote and was carried. The matter was therefore deferred until the next meeting of Assembly 1991.

Mrs Elisabeth Jupp presented the report of the Training Committee and moved resolution 10:

CRCW TRAINING

The Assembly receives the report of the Training Committee on the training of CRCWs in paragraphs 81-94 of the book of Reports, supports their recommendations and calls for a report in three years.

Assembly approved.

Resolution 11:

MANSFIELD COLLEGE

The Assembly receives the report of the Visitors to Mansfield College, Oxford in November 1989 and supports their recommendations. (Appendix 11 (A))

was moved by Mrs Jupp and was carried.

Resolution 12 was presented and discussed.

AUXILIARY MINISTRY

- (a) The Assembly determines that the designation auxiliary ministry shall be discontinued. For essential administration purposes the designations stipendiary (SM) and non-stipendiary (NSM) shall be used. (See paragraphs 114-118 book of Reports).
- (b) The Assembly asks the Vocations Committee to consider the implications in relation to the Roll of Ministers, and to advise accordingly.

(c) The Assembly asks the Business Committee to assist the Ministries Department in preparing appropriate amendments to the Basis of Union.

The Resolution was approved.

The Moderator thanked the Revd Tony Burnham on his retirement as Convener of the Ministries Department. Assembly showed its gratitude with applause. Mr Burnham thanked the members of the team of the Department.

The General Assembly agrees that the Church of St Augustine, North Springfield, be received as a local church of the URC.

The Resolutions were carried nem. con.

The Revd John Hayward, a minister of the LEP and priest in charge of St Augustine's, was received by the Moderator on behalf of the Assembly.

Communication and Supplies

The Moderator called upon the Committee Convener, the Revd David Netherwood, to introduce the report. Printing errors to the text were amended as follows:

para.1, line 4, close sentence at articles. Continue They asked...etc. para. 2, the fractions should read 2 times the ordinary letter post and 2 times at the end of line 3.

The Convener then presented the report for debate and moved Resolution 1.

The Assembly receives this report for debate.

After comments, Resolution 2 was moved:

COPYRIGHT

The Assembly urges all provinces, districts and local congregations to ensure that they are keeping within the law as covered by the Copyright, Designs and Patents Act, 1988, giving special regard to Hymn Book Supplements, service and Hymn Sheets, together with items reproduced in church magazines.

This was discussed, put to the vote and carried.

The Moderator thanked the Revd David Netherwood for his work as Convener of the Committee and Assembly responded with applause.

The thanks of the Assembly will be sent to the Revd Edmund Banyard on his retirement from the Editorial Board of REFORM. This concluded the business of the Communication and Supplies Committee.

Provincial Moderators' Report

The Moderator called upon the Revd David Jenkins to present the report was received for debate. Informal discussion followed and comments were shared on the quality of worship, care and discipleship in our local churches. The business of the Provincial Moderators was concluded.

Nominations Committee

Owing to the illness of the Committee Convener, the Revd Brian Nuttall, Mr David Butler was authorised to speak to the Assembly on his behalf and he moved that the Assembly receives the report for debate.

The Assembly was invited to approve Resolution 2:

COMMITTEE OFFICERS

The Assembly appoints Committee Officers as set out in paragraph 3 of the report.

and to appoint:

Departmental Secretary, Church & Society Department The Revd Peter Brain (approximately September 1990 for term of 7 years)
Convener, Ministries Department - Revd Keith Forecast (to 1996)
Convener, Missionary & Ecumenical Work at Home Committee Revd Murdoch Mackenzie (to 1996)
Convener, Communication & Supplies Committee Mr Chris Wright (to 1996)

This was agreed.

Assembly was invited to approve Resolution -

PRAYER HANDBOOK

The Assembly appoints the Revd Kate Compston to serve as Editor of the Prayer Handbooks for 1993 to 1995 inclusive. and this was carried nem, con.

An amendment to representatives of the URC on other bodies: delete Mrs S C Brain as representative to the Palatinate Synod and insert the Revd Graham Cook. With this amendment, and with a supplementary list presented later in the Assembly, Mr Butler moved:

Assembly appoints Committees and Representatives of the Church, as set out in the Appendix to the report.

The motion was approved.

The full list of Committees stands as an appendix to this Record of Assembly.

On behalf of the Ministries Department Mrs Elisabeth Jupp proposed:

WESTMINSTER COLLEGE STAFF APPOINTMENT

The Assembly

(a) resolves that the Revd William White Mahood, BA, MTh be appointed as the Director of Pastoral Studies (The Cheshunt Chair) at Westminster College, Cambridge, as from 1st September 1990, for a period of five years, renewable for a further period of up to two years,

and

(b) requests the Cambridge District Council to arrange, in consultation with the Senatus, for the necessary induction to take place.

The Revd Michael Dunford supported the proposal and other comments were made. The Resolution was moved and carried and the Revd Bill Mahood was received by the Moderator as Assembly applauded.

Church and Society Department

The Convener, Dr Mary Ede, introduced the report and expressed appreciation of the work of the Revd John Reardon on his retirement as Secretary of the Department. The Moderator wished John well on his new calling on behalf of the Assembly.

Resolution 1 was moved and the report was received for debate.

The Rt Revd D S Bax, Moderator of the Presbyterian Church of Southern Africa, was invited to speak on the situation in South Africa.

Many other comments were made, during which suspension of Standing Orders 2b and 3b (Manual p76) affecting the presentation of business, was moved by the Revd Alan Evans. This was passed by more than 75%.

Mr Evans then moved:

COMMUNITY CHARGE

Members of General Assembly of the URC in the UK wish to inform Her Majesty's Government of their opposition to flat rate tax with particular reference to the Community Charge and request the government to look again at the Community Charge, taking into account people's ability to pay.

The motion was seconded by the Revd John Jenkins. On being put to the vote the motion was carried.

The Convener noted the comments of members and invited the Revd John Reardon to move Resolutions 3 and 4:

3. The Assembly calls upon Her Majesty's Government to work with other nations to secure peace with justice throughout Central America and, in particular, to press the United States Government to use its influence for peace in that region.

An amendment was proposed by the Revd Richard Helmn and seconded by the Revd Peter Trow, to add to Resolution 3 the words for example, by ceasing delivery of all military-related assistance to El Salvador and promoting negotiations between the Salvadorean Government and the FMLN. The Department was willing to accept the amendment which was accepted and it became part of the substantive resolution:

CENTRAL AMERICA

3. The Assembly calls upon Her Majesty's Government to work with other nations to secure peace with justice throughout Central America and, in particular, to press the United States Government to use its influence for peace in that region, for example, by ceasing delivery of all military-related assistance to El Salvador and promoting negotiations between the Salvadorean Government and the FMLN.

This was then put to the vote and carried.

4. The Assembly encourages the churches to pray for the people of Central America in their continuing suffering and to help their members to understand the problems and issues of that region by engaging annually in Central America Week.

Resolution 4 was moved and approved.

The Convener, Dr Mary Ede, called upon the Revd Martin Hazell to propose Resolution 5:

AIDS DAY

The Assembly encourages the churches to observe World AIDS Day on 1st December 1990.

The Resolution was moved and, following comments, was put to the vote and was carried, nem. con.

The Moderator called upon the Revd Elizabeth Nash to propose Resolution 2 on behalf of the Department:

CHURCH ACTION ON POVERTY

The Assembly welcomes the Declaration of Church Action on Poverty, Hearing the Cry of the Poor, and commends it to the churches for study, endorsement and use as a preparation for action. Numerous comments were made, to which the Revd Elizabeth Nash replied. The Resolution was moved and carried nem. con.

Synod Resolutions

Mrs Sheila Brain proposed the Resolution from the Mersey Synod:

DEFENCE AND ARMS INDUSTRY

This Assembly

Joins with HMG in welcoming changes in the political climate of Eastern Europe and the Soviet Union, the end of the cold war, and positive prospects for meaningful disarmament measures;

Agrees with HMG that these developments will have implications for defence industries in the UK:

Notes with concern that HMG has no plans to initiate, support or finance conversion from military to civil production in these industries;

Fears that this policy of non-intervention will result in large scale unemployment and/or an increase in the arms trade

And calls upon HMG to reverse this policy and to:

- a) initiate without delay a comprehensive review of defence policy
- b) co-operate with the industries concerned in planning a transition to non-military production
- c) invest financially in such programmes where necessary.

This was formally moved by the seconder, the Revd David Lawrence, and debate followed. The motion was put to the vote and passed.

Private Members' Motions

Housing and Homelessness

A Resolution on Housing and Homelessness was proposed by the Revd Richard Cox and Mr Roy Smith.

The General Assembly of the URC expresses its concern at the ever increasing problem of homelessness in our society, and the aggravation of the problem caused by many changes in Government policy in recent years.

- i. We request that urgent consideration be given by Her Majesty's Government to a realistic ten-year programme to provide social housing at affordable rents, greater co-operation between the Department of the Environment, Department of Social Security and the Department of Health in formulating housing policy, and the fundamental need to formulate regional policy.
- ii. We request that a larger share of capital gained from the sale of council houses be made available for Local Authority development

programmes, and greater encouragement be given to Local Authorities and private owners to enable poor housing to be habitable.

- iii. In the meantime as a matter of priority Her Majesty's Government is urged
 - a) to encourage the provision of publicly-funded, good quality, direct-access accommodation as part of a Local Authority programme to resettle long-term homeless people in permanent accommodation;

and

b) in the forthcoming Code of Guidance to Local Authorities to strengthen responsibility for housing vulnerable young homeless people.

This was put to the vote and carried.

National Health Service

A Resolution was proposed by the Revd James Neary and seconded by the Revd Robin Hine:

Assembly, recognising the significant under-funding of the NHS as instanced in the response of the FCFC to the White Paper Working for Patients

- a) encourages District Councils and local churches to take up implications of the FCFC response with local health authorities
- b) supports the Secretary of State's pressure on the government to secure increased funding for the NHS
- c) instructs the General Secretary to forward this resolution to the Secretary of State and the Chancellor of the Exchequer.

This was carried nem. con.

Forward Policy Group

The Convener, Professor Robert Steel, was called upon to present the report of the Forward Policy Group. The report was received for debate. It was noted that a decision had not yet been taken for a residential Assembly to be held in 1992 and that the last paragraph on p76 of the report was therefore incorrect. Professor Steel replied to points raised. The Moderator expressed the thanks of the Church to Professor Steel on his retirement from leadership of the Group and Assembly responded with applause.

This concluded the business of the Forward Policy Group.

Executive Committee

The Revd Keith Forecast, immediate past Moderator of Assembly, was called upon to present the report. It was proposed that the report be received for debate. This was agreed.

Comments were called for on paragraphs not covered by the Resolutions. The Moderator greeted the Revd Martin Hazell as Assembly applauded the extension of his Special Ministry by a further two years. The subject of *Directions Towards Growth* was raised and a request made for the document to be made public.

The Convener responded to the comments and introduced Resolution 2, paying tribute to the contribution the Revd Janet Sowerbutts has made to the work of Westminster College:

APPOINTMENT OF PROVINCIAL MODERATOR

The Assembly appoints the Revd Janet Sowerbutts as Moderator of the Thames North Province Synod for a term of seven years from 1st September 1990.

The Resolution was put to the vote and carried nem. con. The Induction has been arranged by Thames North Province for a date in September.

Resolution 3 was moved:

HISTORY SOCIETY ARCHIVES

The Assembly agrees that the History Society may negotiate with the Association of County Councils or with individual County Councils which desire to hold the records of PCE local churches or Presbyteries, provided that any such agreements ensure that the URC has a gratis copy on microfilm or microfiche of such records and the necessary reading equipment.

Discussion followed. The Convener replied and the motion was put to the vote and carried.

General Secretary - Retirement Date

The Moderator announced that the General Secretary had given notice of his intention to retire in July 1992 on reaching the age of 65. A proposal was therefore made:

The Executive Committee will begin in July this year with the preparatory work as set out in our Rules of Procedure (Manual p73) so that the nominating process may lead through to the next Assembly.

Assembly accepted this proposal.

Advocacy Group

The Moderator called upon the Revd Michael Davies to present the report of the Advocacy Group.

Mr Davies invited the Revd Bill Wright, Secretary of the Group, to speak. Mr Wright outlined the Group's plans for the future and the resolution that the Assembly receives the report of the Advocacy Group was moved and approved.

Debate followed and the Revd Michael Davies responded with thanks to the Assembly. the Moderator thanked Mr Davies on behalf of the whole Church for his

service and expressed good wishes for his future in the world Church. Assembly responded with applause. This concluded the business of the Advocacy Group.

Guest Speaker - The Revd Dr Philip Morgan

The Moderator introduced the Revd Dr Philip Morgan, minister of the URC and Secretary of the British Council of Churches, who addressed the Assembly on the subject of the ecumenical calling of the Church in the overall purpose of God for the unity of all humanity. Dr Morgan was thanked by the Moderator, who paid tribute to the gifts which Dr Morgan had brought to the growth of the ecumenical movement. Assembly expressed its gratitude in applause.

World Church and Mission

The Moderator called upon the Department to present its report. The Convener, Mrs Mary Marsden, proposed Resolution 1 requesting Assembly to receive the report, which was approved.

Mrs Mary Marsden then introduced the new Consultant in Rural Work, the Revd Michael Cruchley, who was presented to the Moderator.

The Adviser for Local Ecumenism, the Revd Peter Poulter, was also welcomed by the Moderator.

The Missionary and Ecumenical Work at Home Committee report was presented for comment.

The Mission and Other Faiths Committee report was introduced by the Convener, the Revd John Sutcliffe, and the Revd Dr David Bowen was invited to speak. The report was presented for comment. The Convener replied and concluded the report of the Committee.

The report of the Personnel Committee was introduced by the Convener, the Revd Raymond Adams, who presented the Revd Elizabeth Brown to the Moderator on completion of her service in Taiwan. the minister at Maidstone URC, the Revd Keith McNicol, spoke about the Maidstone URC/Zimbabwe link through the visit of the Revd Imon Ndlovu. Mrs Ruby Angell described the visit to the Cheshire District of the Revd Templeton Mahlinza and his wife. Also introduced to the Moderator was the Revd A Samraj Jayakaran from the Church of South India, who was interviewed by Mr Adams and spoke about his ministry in Ilford. Miss Gillian Whiting was asked to speak about her appointment to service in the Solomon Islands.

This concluded the report of the Personnel Committee.

The Revd John Slow was asked by the Convener of the Department to speak to Resolution 2:

DECADE OF EVANGELISM

Aware of the plans for a Decade of Evangelism and believing that the permanent character of the church as a witnessing community should be emphasised, the Assembly encourages local churches, District Councils and Synods to seek participation in all the preparation for and development of the Decade.

This was moved and comments followed, after which the Resolution was put to the vote and carried nem. con.

Resolution 3, also relating to the MEW Home Committee report, was presented by the Convener, the Revd John Slow, who invited the Revd John Reardon, the new General Secretary of Council of Churches for Britain and Ireland, to address the Assembly.

INTER-CHURCH PROCESS

At this point of change in the ecumenical movement in Britain and Ireland:

- 1. The Assembly gives thanks to God for the great variety of important work done by the British Council of Churches in the search for unity and effective witness. This work has both served and stimulated URC and its predecessors, has enabled many international links to be maintained and has engaged the URC in the broadest struggles for justice and peace. The Assembly is grateful to all who have given their service in this enterprise, and whose readiness for change enables the new phase to begin; and
- 2. The Assembly sends a message of goodwill to the new bodies to be inaugurated in September and pledges full co-operation and support; and
- 3. The Assembly asks all Assembly Committees to ensure that, them before planning any new project or programme, there is an opportunity to discuss whether it can be done ecumenically; and
- 4. The Assembly asks the Assembly Departments to consider how best to share with the wider fellowship those particular emphases and skills which have been developed in the URC; and
- 5. The Assembly encourages the Provincial Synods and District Councils to continue in the development of intermediate levels of ecumenical co-operation.; and encourages local churches to press ahead with the wide variety of inter-church witness and service; and
- 6. The Assembly affirms that URC will be a sponsoring church of Christian Aid.

This series of Resolutions was approved.

The Chaplain was asked to lead the Assembly in prayer.

The Revd John Slow was called upon to speak to Resolution 4:

METHODIST-URC RELATIONSHIPS

The Assembly receives the Statement of the Methodist/URC Liaison Committee and authorises the World Church and Mission Department to undertake the consultation described, in parallel with the process in the Methodist Church.

This was moved and debate ensued. During the discussion the Revd George Thomas referred to the following resolution which had been proposed by the Wessex Synod:

6. Recognising God's purpose of bringing all creation together into unity, the Assembly agrees that with the desire for ultimate union between the

Methodist and United Reformed Churches, there be held a national consultation, with a view to establishing a closer relationship between the two churches.

Mr Thomas stated that this Resolution would not be pressed to a vote in the light of the Department's Resolution, but requested that it stand in the Minutes of the Assembly.

The Convener replied to comments and the Resolution 4 was put to the vote and passed by a large majority with a few against and a few abstentions.

The Departmental Convener asked the Convener of the Urban Rural Mission Group, the Revd Charles Brock, to present the report of the Group. Ms Gay Cox was invited to speak to the Assembly and was followed by the Revd David Bedford and the Revd John Sutcliffe. Resolution 5 was then moved and discussed:

URBAN RURAL MISSION

Noting the work done by the Urban Rural Mission Group:

- The Assembly recognises the need for continued work on the nature and implications of the missionary calling in our society, and requests the World Church and Mission Department to present further recommendations on this theme from time to time.
- 2 The Assembly instructs the World Church and Mission Department to plan adequate resourcing of the Urban Rural Mission Group for a period of three years from this Assembly.

This was put to the vote and approved.

The Revd Derek Wales, Convener of Missionary and Ecumenical Work Abroad Committee, proposed Resolution 6:

EASTERN EUROPE

- The Assembly acknowledges that through years of oppression a costly contribution to the maintenance and renewal of the life of their nations has been made by Churches and individual Christians in Eastern Europe through faithful prayer and witness to Christ.
- 2. The Assembly rejoices with sister Churches there in the growing opportunities open to the whole people for freedom of worship and expression, for participation in the political process and for economic development.
- 3. The Assembly reaffirms the continuing support of the United Reformed Church through worship, prayer and personal contact for the Churches and the whole community as they seek to promote the well-being of nations and to protect the rights of conscience and belief.
- 4. The Assembly looks forward to increased opportunities for contact and fellowship and to learning from the experience of our sister churches in Eastern Europe.

and comments were invited. The Revd John Johansen-Berg asked that greetings should be sent to Bishop Lazslo Tokes and to Dr Josef Hromadka with copies of the Resolutions in the event of their being passed. The Resolution was then moved and carried nem. con.

Mrs Mary Marsden emphasised the Department's debt to the Revd John Slow on his retirement as Convener of the Missionary and Ecumenical Work at Home Committee and the Assembly greeted him through the Moderator. This concluded the business of the World Church and Mission Department.

Faith and Life Department

The Moderator called upon the Convener of the Department, the Revd Dr Philip Morgan to introduce the report of the Faith and Life Department. Dr Morgan asked and received permission for the Revd John Richardson to interview the Committee Conveners. Mrs Rosalind Goodfellow was interviewed about the work of the Windermere Policy and Planning Committee. The Revd Dr Lesley Husselbee spoke about the Children's Work Committee report, with reference to the Charter for Children in the Church. The Master Pilot, the Revd Chris Baker, spoke of developments planned by the Pilots Panel. The Revd William Mahood spoke to the Christian Education and Stewardship Committee report. The Health and Healing Committee Convener, the Revd Alasdair Pratt, clarified that committee's report; he was assisted by the Revd Terry Oakley. The Revd Colin Gunton was questioned about the Doctrine and Worship Committee's report.

Mr Richardson thanked the Committee for the production of the Prayer Handbook.

Mrs Ruth Clarke spoke for the Youth Committee. Dr Morgan then moved Resolution 1, that the Assembly receives the Report of the Faith and Life Department for debate, which was carried.

The sections of the report not covered by Resolutions were discussed.

Resolution 2:

CHARTER FOR CHILDREN

Assembly receives the discussion document Towards a charter for Children in the Church and commends it to Provinces, Districts and churches for discussion.

was moved by the Revd Stephen Thornton, Secretary of the Children's Work Committee. Comments were answered and, when put to the vote, the Resolution was carried.

Dr Philip Morgan was invited to present to the Assembly those Youth Leadership Training Officers who were present and Janet Turner, John Quilter, Colin Capewell, Ivan Andrews, John Kendall, and Sandra Ackroyd were greeted by the Moderator. Greetings were also sent to Wallie Warmington.

The retiring National Youth Training Officer, Mr Roger Tolman, was presented to the Moderator and received, amid applause.

The Revd Colin Gunton presented the Moderator with a copy of the new Service Book.

The Moderator called upon Mrs Ruth Clarke to propose the Resolutions on the New FURY Project. Resolution 1:

YOUTH WORK

The General Assembly reaffirms the aims and objectives of youth work in the URC as set out in the book of Reports. was moved and carried unanimously.

Mrs Clarke then moved Resolution 2, a, b and c:

FURY PROJECT

- a. The General Assembly agrees to adopt in principle the New FURY Project, believing it to be the way forward for youth work in the URC and recognising that this will incorporate the redevelopment of the Yardley Hastings church, manse and hall.
- b. The Assembly gives approval for the launch of a national appeal in support of the New FURY Project and agrees that the 17 February 1991 should be designated as FURY Sunday.
- c. The Assembly approves the appointment of a full-time stipendiary minister to be based at Yardley Hastings as Chaplain. the appointment to be made after further consultation and at the approval of the Executive Committee for an initial period of 5 years.

Mrs Clarke asked that the debate should cover all three parts, but be voted upon separately. This was opposed and it was agreed that the vote should be taken as one Resolution. A request that a ballot should be held was opposed and rejected by the Assembly.

An amendment to Resolution 2a was proposed by the Revd Peter Poulter and the Revd Richard Helmn:

After New FURY Project add the words as outlined in paragraphs 3.1 - 11.3 of the Report; insert full stop after in the URC and delete rest of sentence.

The Moderator stated that this was not in order as it negated the purpose of the Resolution.

An amendment to 2b was proposed by Dr Jim Brown to add the words The appeal will be concluded at the commencement of the General Assembly 1991 and the amount then raised by the appeal and from public and private sources will be reviewed by that Assembly before giving final approval to the project or implementing Resolution 2c, if passed.

After comments from the floor, the Revd Thomas Hope, who had seconded the amendment, spoke to it. Mrs Clarke replied and the amendment was put to the vote. It was lost by a very large majority.

Resolution 2 a, b and c, were then debated. Mrs Clarke replied and the Resolution was put to the vote. It was carried by a very large majority.

The Master Pilot, the Revd Chris Baker, moved Resolution 3:

PILOTS

This Assembly gives thanks to God for the 12% growth in the number of Pilot Companies during 1989, supports the modernisation of the movement and encourages churches to consider Pilots as the midweek activity for their children and young people.

which was carried.

The Revd Alasdair Pratt moved Resolution 4:

Assembly, recognising the increasing problems faced by people suffering from mental illness, and those with mental handicap, as they are discharged into the community

- a) renews its call to all churches to consider, as a matter of urgency, ways of overcoming negative attitudes and of promoting positive care:
- b) commends the leaflet Christians and Community Care published by the Church and Society Department for the BCC, and
- encourages churches to use the experience and resources of Chaplains involved in health care.

An amendment was proposed by Mr Paul Van Walwyk: after BCC, to add the words and urges local churches to use it as a discussion resource leading to action.

After seconding by Paul Chandler, this was agreed by the Department and became part of the substantive Resolution.

It was moved that the addition be made and the motion was carried.

COMMUNITY CARE

Assembly, recognising the increasing problems faced by people suffering from mental illness, and those with mental handicap, as they are discharged into the community

- a) renews its call to all churches to consider, as a matter of urgency, ways of overcoming negative attitudes and of promoting positive care;
- b) commends the leaflet Christians and Community Care published by the Church and Society Department for the BCC, and urges local churches to use it as a discussion resource leading to action.
- encourages churches to use the experience and resources of Chaplains involved in health care.

The Secretary of the Doctrine and Worship Committee, the Revd John Taylor, spoke to Resolution 5:

The Assembly approves the revised Guidelines for Presidency at the Sacraments, and requests the Doctrine and Worship Committee to help Districts and local churches to implement them.

An amendment was proposed by the Revd Julian Macro to add the words *be authorised to* before the word *preside* on page 111, para. 42.2.4 of the Reports, guidelines for Presidency at the Sacraments. This amendment was accepted by the Committee, seconded by Mrs Margaret Carrick-Smith, and agreed. After discussion a deferment motion was called by the Revd Richard Helmn. This was seconded and put to the vote. It was carried and the matter was deferred.

The Revd Dr Philip Morgan was called upon to propose Resolution 6:

YOUTH AND CHILDREN'S WORK TRAINERS

General Assembly, recognising the value of sharing resources across youth and children's work, and welcoming the direction of developments outlined in the Faith and Life Department report, agrees in principle to change from YLTO's to YCWT's, where they are employed full time by one

Province, and asks the Department to implement these changes as soon as possible, in consultation with the Provinces involved.

Mrs Kate Breeze proposed an alternative Resolution: General Assembly reaffirms the ideal of the appointment of one full-time YLTO in each Province and affirms the need for children's work trainers in each Province. Assembly therefore asks the Department to explore ways in which both these needs

After discussion, the Convener replied and the Department's Resolution was put to the vote and was carried. Mrs Breeze therefore did not put her alternative Resolution.

Assembly Pastoral Reference Committee

The Convener, the Revd Cyril Franks, presented the report, underlining his tribute to the Revd Bernard Thorogood. Assembly endorsed his remarks with applause.

Finance and Administration Department

The Convener, Mr Angus Grimmond, introduced the report of the Department.

Amendments were made to the headings of the columns:page 148, para. 38 columns should read:

Society/Trust

Joint Purchase

Ceilings

can be met.

Ceilings

page 149 in Appendix 1: the two right hand columns should read:

£ per member

Also in this Appendix the Unified Appeal contribution for the Yorkshire Province should read £12 per member, not £2 per member.

The accounts were produced for the year 1989, not 1990 as printed on the cover.

The Revd John Waller presented the Maintenance of the Ministry Report.

Mr Grimmond moved Resolution 1, that the Assembly receives the report of the Finance and Administration Department for debate. this was agreed. Paragraphs not covered by the Resolutions were considered.

Mr Waller and Mr Clem Frank replied to questions and comments.

Mr Grimmond moved Resolution 2:

Assembly adopts the accounts for 1989

and replied to a question. The Resolution was put to the vote and carried.

Mr Grimmond proposed the acceptance of a change to paragraph 20 of Appendix 3 of the report:

Function of the Central Committee

20. The Central Committee, which has spent much of its time in past years in receiving reports from committees within the Department and in dealing with matters which will now be handled by the Financial Resources Committee, feels that it has served its purpose, and may now be disbanded. The co-ordinating role between committees within the Department will now be exercised by the Convener, and the Secretary Treasurer and Chief Accountant. Each Province will be represented on the Financial Resources Committee, and this is the place where the Provinces may, in future, participate in forming policy regarding the central finances of the Church.

Words underlined - deleted Words in bold type - added

The amendment was accepted.

Resolution 3:

The Assembly approves the proposals for the reorganisation of the Finance Department and its Committees, as contained in Appendix 3 to the report.

was moved and carried.

The Clerk announced that, with reference to Resolution 3 of the Finance and Administration report regarding proposals for the reorganisation of the Finance Department the Resolution had been incorrectly presented and was therefore inadequate to cover the intention of the Department. He proposed that the Resolution should read:

AMALGAMATION OF FUNDS AND REORGANISATION OF COMMITTEES

The Assembly approves the proposals for the amalgamation of the Maintenance of the Ministry Fund with the Unified Appeal and for the reorganisation of the Finance Department and its Committees, as contained in appendix 3 to the report.

Assembly agreed to accept the amended Resolution and after comment the revised Resolution was moved and carried.

The Revd John Waller presented Resolution 4:

MoM BUDGET

The Assembly approves the Budget of the Maintenance of the Ministry Fund for 1991 noting that it allows for an increase of 8% in the basic stipend from 1st July 1991.

which was moved and carried.

Resolution 5 was introduced by Mr Waller and comments were made.

REVISION OF RESOLUTION ON MINISTERS' HOUSING

Assembly agrees to revise its Resolution of 1979 (Record, pp11 & 12) as follows:

- 1. The Assembly resolves that the provision of a dwelling for the minister shall continue to be part of the normal conditions of service.
- 2. The Assembly calls upon pastorates whose minister lives in a church-owned manse, to ensure that a separate room (in church or manse) is available for use solely as a study.
- 3. The Assembly requests District Councils (taking advice from Province where required) to take note of the condition and facilities of the manse, or if alternative housing arrangements are to be made, to approve the details of the arrangements, before concurring in calls and when making visitations.
- 4. The Assembly acknowledges
 - a) the wish of some ministers to be owner-occupiers and
 - the problem such a course can create for the stewards of the Church's material resources;
 - c) the desirability of reviewing housing allowances annually.

When moved, the Resolution was carried.

Mr Waller proposed that the words *or her* be inserted into Resolution 6, 6.3.1, line 2, following the word *his*, which would then read:

PLAN FOR PARTNERSHIP AMENDMENT

Assembly amends the Plan for Partnership in Ministerial Remuneration by the amendment of paragraph 6.3.1 as follows:

6.3.1 House, free of rent, rates (where payable) etc: for the purposes of the Plan a house or manse means a home for the minister and his or her immediate family provided and maintained in good repair and decorated, free of rent, ground rent, all rates (where payable) and property insurance; and payment of costs of removal into such accommodation. If the manse is not owned or leased by the church, a housing allowance approved by the pastorate and the minister shall be payable to the minister. For the avoidance of any doubt, Community Charge, which is a personal local tax, is not regarded as rates. Guidelines for calculating such allowances shall be issued by the central M of M Committee (see Appendix C).

Assembly agreed. The Resolution was then moved and carried.

Resolution 7 was then proposed by Mr Waller, moved and approved:

PLAN FOR PARTNERSHIP AMENDMENT

Assembly amends the Plan for Partnership in Ministerial Remuneration as follows:

re-number paragraph 8.2 as 8.2.1

Paragraph 8.2.2.

A similar loan is available to auxiliary ministers who have qualified for the whole-time stipendiary ministry, payable at the time that they take up the whole-time stipendiary ministry. Mr Grimmond voiced the thanks of the Committee to the Revd John Waller, Revd Julian Macro and Mr Desmond Davies at the end of their service to the Department and the Moderator greeted them to the Assembly's applause. Mr Grimmond was also thanked by the Moderator for his work for the Department.

Budget Committee

The Moderator called upon the Convener of the Budget Committee. The Revd Alasdair Walker spoke to the report and made the following amendments to the text:

page 155, para.1, line 4: for £38,000 read £58,000 para.2(b): for £60,000 read £53,000

The report was then received for debate and Resolution 2 was moved and carried.

1991 BUDGET

Assembly approves the Budget for 1991 which provides for an expenditure of £2,300,000.

The Moderator welcomed the Revd Janet Sowerbutts, newly-appointed Moderator of the Thames North Province, and Assembly received her with applause.

Business Committee

The Revd Adrian Wells was called upon to propose Resolution 3:

1992 ASSEMBLY

Assembly agrees

- a) to hold a further residential Assembly in 1992.
- b) that the venue shall be the University of York.
- c) that the dates shall be Saturday 4 July to Tuesday 7 July 1992.

After discussion the Resolution was put to the vote and passed.

Resolution 4 was proposed by Mr Wells:

AMENDMENTS TO MANUAL

- a) Assembly approves the amendments to the Manual indicated by italics in the document circulated with the book of Reports.
- b) Assembly refers the amendments so approved to Provincial Synods and sets the date of 31 December 1990 for any Synod to resolve that these amendments be not proceeded with. (Manual 10(i)e)

and an amendment was proposed by the Revd David Pitkeathly:

amend 4 a) by deleting full stop after Reports (line 2) and inserting ...except those relating to the Statement of Faith (para. 17 of the Basis of Union).

This was seconded by Mrs Rita Page. After a number of comments, Mr Wells resisted the amendment on behalf of the Business Committee and it was put to the vote.

Tellers were called and the vote taken. The amendment was carried and became part of the substantive Resolution.

The revised Resolution was then debated.

A proposal that the motion be now put was agreed and Mr Wells replied to the comments. The motion was carried by a very large majority.

a) Assembly approves the amendments to the Manual indicated by italics in the document circulated with the book of Reports except those relating to the Statement of Faith (para.17 of the Basis of Union).

The Clerk announced that, on the advice of the Legal Adviser, an amendment was proposed:

page 6, para.23, after the word unification on line 2, insert the words as defined by the United Reformed Church Act 1981.

page 21, 1st main para. after president insert (who shall perform the functions defined as applicable to the chairman in the United Reformed Church Acts 1972 and 1981)

These insertions were agreed.

Election for the Moderator of General Assembly 1991-2

The Moderator called upon the Revd Greta Morgan, on behalf of the tellers, to announce the result of the ballot. The result was: Votes counted 506, of which 3 were invalid, and the Revd Malcolm Hanson was declared elected.

Mr Hanson was received by the Moderator and spoke briefly to the Assembly.

The Resolution from the Northern Synod:

AMENDMENT TO DISTRICT COUNCIL MEMBERSHIP

Assembly agrees to the addition of the words Church Related Community Worker to the Basis of Union The Structures of the United Reformed Church 9(3)(a) to read: All ministers (other than auxiliary ministers), deaconesses, registered local pastors and church related community workers engaged directly in the service of the United Reformed Church within that District.

was proposed by the Revd Richard Helmn. The Moderator reminded the Assembly that the Resolution would require a two thirds majority and that, if passed, would be subject to the two year rule. The Resolution was moved, seconded by the Revd Peter Poulter and was carried. The Clerk then proposed:

That this Resolution be referred to District Councils and Synods with the date of 31 December 1990 for any to respond that this proposal be not proceeded with.

This was approved.

The Resolution from the West Midlands Synod was proposed by the Revd B Holroyd.

PRESIDENCY AT HOLY COMMUNION

To add to Clause 25 (Manual p7) the following:

General Assembly authorises all internship students for the ministry of the United Reformed Church to preside at the Sacrament of Holy Communion in the church or churches in which they are serving their internship should the church meeting/s invite them to do so.

This was formally seconded by Mr R Webb and was debated. After discussion the proposers were asked not to press the matter to a vote and the Assembly referred the matter back to the Doctrine and Worship Committee for further consideration. The Committee Secretary, the Revd John Taylor, welcomed the request and the proposers agreed not to press the Resolution. Assembly approved of this action.

The Resolution from the Thames North Synod was proposed by Mrs M Stacy.

DATES OF ASSEMBLY

General Assembly makes every endeavour to avoid future meetings of Assembly being held in Christian Aid Week.

The Convener of the Business Committee, the Revd Adrian Wells, explained the constraints by which the fixing of the dates of Assembly are bound. Mrs Margaret Carrick-Smith moved that the motion be not put and Assembly agreed.

The Convener of the Business Committee moved the suspension of Standing Order 2d, which was agreed. The Revd Tony Burnham then presented Resolution 3 which was moved:

DAY OF PRAYER

Assembly records its gratitude to the Group for Evangelism and Renewal for taking the initiative in organising a day for prayer for the life and witness of the United Reformed Church on the Saturday before Assembly and asks the Business Committee to incorporate such preparation in the regular arrangements for future Assemblies.

It was seconded by the Revd Donald Hilton and supported by speakers from the floor. It was carried nem. con.

The Moderator called upon the Convener of the Business Committee, the Revd Adrian Wells, to read a Resolution:

Assembly places on record and asks that all participants be informed of its thanks to all who contributed to the success of last evening's Travelling on - to those who first conceived the idea; to those responsible for its detailed planning and preparation; to the production and staging teams; to those who photographed and arranged the slide and overhead projector programmes; to the actors and narrators; to the singers and instrumentalists, both corporate and solo; to the conductor; to the choreographers and dancers; to the moderatorial guest artists. It was a thought-provoking, colourful, entertaining, challenging and devotional evening -to the glory of God. We say Thank you.

Proposer: Rupert Norris - South Yorkshire District Seconder: Julia Gilbey - Wakefield & Dewsbury District The Revd David Wiseman was called upon to move a vote of thanks of the Assembly to all who had contributed to its smooth running and to those who had enhanced its life.

These votes of thanks were carried with acclamation.

The Clerk declared that the Assembly, having completed the business properly brought before it, stands adjourned and will meet again at Torbay on Monday, 29th April 1991 or at such other date and place as may be duly appointed.

Closing worship was conducted by the Chaplain, Mrs Ruth Clarke, during which the newly-appointed Secretary of the Church and Society Department, the Revd Peter Brain, was inducted into office.

In presenting the Central Fund Accounts for the year ended 31st December 1989, I would draw your attention to the following points;-

- In order to increase the income of the Ministerial Training Fund and certain sundry trusts (utilised for the improvement of the income of pensioners), some of the investments were realised at December 31st 1989 and were reinvested in high yielding deposit accounts early in 1990. As a result, the Balance Sheet shows a higher than normal cash balance, and an overdrawn cash balance is shown on the Common Investment Fund.
- 2 The central funds have increased by £1.3 million over the year to £11.1 million. In addition to the surplus on the realisation of investments, receipts from legacies (excluding legacies for the Retired Ministers Housing Society) were about £87,000, support of the Ministerial Training Fund showed an additional £74,000 as the result of the special appeal. The Church is indeed grateful for the gifts it receives. Nearly £250,000 profit was realised on the sale of properties.
- 3 The General fund (p57) report shows that income exceeded expenditure by £58,000, partly due to the high level of interest rates which prevailed throughout the year and which cannot be expected to continue indefinitely. The cost of staff for the central work of the Church is rising each year at a level in excess of the retail price index. The efforts of so many voluntary helpers is a considerable factor in keeping the overall cost within our resources, which have been increased by higher contributions from Church Members.
- 4 The contributions from local churches and a higher level of donations and dividends enabled the Maintenance of the Ministry Fund (p58) to meet its commitments to our ministers. With the continuing uncertainty ahead regarding the cost of the community charge it is heartening that we have reserves to allow us to react to new situations with sympathy and promptness.
- Retired Ministers Housing. There is still need to support this area. However, with legacies, allocations from the Memorial Hall Trust and general funds, all requirements were met in 1989. Although we have a substantial number of houses we are not yet in the position to meet all requirements from the sale of the existing available housing stock. The very generous gifts and legacies are most gladly acknowledged.
- 5 Windermere. From January 1st 1989, the Faith and Life department bore the cost of the Director's supplement, but the grant from general funds ceased. It is pleasing to see that Windermere broke even in 1989.

REPORT OF THE AUDITORS TO THE UNITED REFORMED CHURCH

We have audited the accounts on pages 49 to 70 in accordance with Auditing Standards.

In our opinion these accounts give a true and fair view of the state of the funds as at 31st December 1989, and of the income and expenditure for the year ended on that date.

We have also audited the accounts of the United Reformed Church Retired Ministers Housing Society Limited and the United Reformed Church Ministers Pension Fund in accordance with Auditing Standards. We have given an unqualified opinion in respect of both these sets of accounts.

1. Scope of these accounts

These accounts comprise those funds administered in the central office of the United Reformed Church on behalf of United Reformed Church Trust or the United Reformed Church Retired Ministers Housing Society Limited. They do not therefore include funds administered by Provincial and other officers.

2. Classification of accounts listed on page 52

The capital accounts are permanent endowment accounts. The General Fund is for the "furthering the religious and other charitable work of the United Reformed Church". All other funds are more particularly restricted, as indicated by the respective fund titles.

- 3. These accounts have been prepared in accordance with the Accounting Standards Committee Statement of Recommended Practice, No. 2, 'Accounting by Charities' and comply with this in all material respects. The source and application of current assets report, which is not required by this statement, is replaced with a schedule of movements in assets, shown as note 3 on page 53.
- Basis of preparation.

The accounts, which should be read in conjunction with the report of the Finance and Administration Department to Assembly 1990, have been prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified by the inclusion of investments at market value in the Common Investment Fund on page 66, the Investment Pool on page 67, and the United Reformed Church Ministers Pension Fund on page 71.

5. Contributions to Unified Appeal and Maintenance of the Ministry Fund.

Contributions are brought into account on a receipts basis, with the inclusion of receipts in the early part of 1990 relating to 1989. However, where a Province had remitted more than the agreed contribution to the Maintenance of the Ministry Fund by 31st December 1989, the excess is being carried forward as an advance payment on account of the contribution for 1990.

6. Legacies are credited on a receipts basis to the fund designated by the donor or to the General Fund if no fund is designated.

7. Depreciation

(i) Property

No provision for depreciation is made on freehold or leasehold buildings. The Treasurership Committee considers that the requirement of the Statement of Standard Accounting Practice No 12 that freehold and leasehold buildings should be depreciated is not appropriate for the Church, because the Church's policy is to ensure that the buildings are maintained to such a standard that depreciation is negligible. Properties shown in Note 5 at £2.66 million are insured for £6.65 million.

(ii) Cars, furniture and equipment

Depreciation is provided on cars, furniture and equipment so as to write off the relevant assets over their expected useful lives at the following rates per annum:-

Computers	25% on cost
Printing Machinery	20% on cost
Other furniture and equipment	10% on cost

8. Investments

Investments held for the United Reformed Church Ministers Pension Fund, the Common Investment Fund, and the Investment Pool, are stated at market value.

Investments held by other funds are stated at cost. Units held in the Common Investment Fund and the Investment Pool are stated in the accounts of the investing funds at the cost of the units to those funds. The cost is based on quarterly market valuation of the underlying listed investments at the time of purchase. No account is taken of the excess of unrealised gains over unrealised losses in specific investments, having regard to the long term purpose of the investment funds.

Income from investments, including associated the tax credit, has been included to the extent that it was received during the year.

9. United Reformed Church Ministers Pension Fund

The full accounts of the United Reformed Church Ministers Pension Fund, an extract from which is shown on page 71, deal with the resources at the disposal of the trustees and short-term liabilities. Long-term liabilities for pensions and other benefits, which are expected to arise in the future, are not reflected in the accounts. The long-term financial position of the fund is dealt with in the actuarial report. A copy of the full accounts of the United Reformed Church Ministers Pension Fund may be obtained from the Central office of the Church.

10. Stock

Stock consists of books and materials purchased for resale in the Communication and Supplies Section. The stock is stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

11. Westminster College

With the exception of certain building improvements capitalised in between 1983 and 1989, and a house bequeathed to the college in 1986 the buildings and contents of Westminster College are not included in the Central Funds balance sheet, since the College was originally a gift to the Church, the value of which cannot readily be ascertained. The College buildings are insured for £5.90 million.

A valuation of the pension fund was carried out by the actuaries to the Church as at 31st December 1987. At that time, the actuaries reported that there was an unfunded past service liability of £1.23 million on the fund. On the assumption that payments of £500,000 per annum to 1990 are made from the Maintenance of the Ministry Fund (that committee is resolved to make these payments) and payments of £15,000 per annum to 1990 are made from the Retired Ministers Aid Fund, the actuaries have reported that this deficit will be cleared. A further valuation of the pension fund will be carried out by the actuaries as at 31st December 1990. Assembly 1989 agreed to improve the benefits of certain classes of pensioner. The Maintenance of the Ministry Committee is proposing to continue the payment £500,000 per annum until 2000, to allow for these improvements.

ACCOUNTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST DECEMBER 1989

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In presenting the Central Fund Accounts for the year ended 31st December 1989, I would draw your attention to the following points;-

- In order to increase the income of the Ministerial Training Fund and certain sundry trusts (utilised for the improvement of the income of pensioners), some of the investments were realised at December 31st 1989 and were reinvested in high yielding deposit accounts early in 1990. As a result, the Balance Sheet shows a higher than normal cash balance, and an overdrawn cash balance is shown on the Common Investment Fund.
- 2 The central funds have increased by £1.3 million over the year to £11.1 million. In addition to the surplus on the realisation of investments, receipts from legacies (excluding legacies for the Retired Ministers Housing Society) were about £87,000, support of the Ministerial Training Fund showed an additional £74,000 as the result of the special appeal. The Church is indeed grateful for the gifts it receives. Nearly £250,000 profit was realised on the sale of properties.
- The General fund (pl2) report shows that income exceeded expenditure by £58,000, partly due to the high level of interest rates which prevailed throughout the year and which cannot be expected to continue indefinitely. The cost of staff for the central work of the Church is rising each year at a level in excess of the retail price index. The efforts of so many voluntary helpers is a considerable factor in keeping the overall cost within our resources, which have been increased by higher contributions from Church Members.
- 4 The contributions from local churches and a higher level of donations and dividends enabled the Maintenance of the Ministry Fund (pl3) to meet its commitments to our ministers. With the continuing uncertainty ahead regarding the cost of the community charge it is heartening that we have reserves to allow us to react to new situations with sympathy and promptness.
- Retired Ministers Housing. There is still need to support this area. However, with legacies, allocations from the Memorial Hall Trust and general funds, all requirements were met in 1989. Although we have a substantial number of houses we are not yet in the position to meet all requirements from the sale of the existing available housing stock. The very generous gifts and legacies are most gladly acknowledged.
- 5 <u>Windermere</u>. From January 1st 1989, the Faith and Life department bore the cost of the Director's supplement, but the grant from general funds ceased. It is pleasing to see that Windermere broke even in 1989.

ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1. Scope of these accounts

These accounts comprise those funds administered in the central office of the United Reformed Church on behalf of United Reformed Church Trust or the United Reformed Church Retired Ministers Housing Society Limited. They do not therefore include funds administered by Provincial and other officers.

2. Classification of accounts listed on page 7

The capital accounts are permanent endowment accounts. The General Fund is for the "furthering the religious and other charitable work of the United Reformed Church". All other funds are more particularly restricted, as indicated by the respective fund titles.

- 3. These accounts have been prepared in accordance with the Accounting Standards Committee Statement of Recommended Practice, No. 2, 'Accounting by Charities' and comply with this in all material respects. The source and application of current assets report, which is not required by this statement, is replaced with a schedule of movements in assets, shown as note 3 on page 8.
- Basis of preparation.

The accounts, which should be read in conjunction with the report of the Finance and Administration Department to Assembly 1990, have been prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified by the inclusion of investments at market value in the Common Investment Fund on page 21, the Investment Pool on page 22, and the United Reformed Church Ministers Pension Fund on page 26.

5. Contributions to Unified Appeal and Maintenance of the Ministry Fund.

Contributions are brought into account on a receipts basis, with the inclusion of receipts in the early part of 1990 relating to 1989. However, where a Province had remitted more than the agreed contribution to the Maintenance of the Ministry Fund by 31st December 1989, the excess is being carried forward as an advance payment on account of the contribution for 1990.

- Legacies are credited on a receipts basis to the fund designated by the donor or to the General Fund if no fund is designated.
- 7. Depreciation
 - No provision for depreciation is made on freehold or leasehold buildings. The Treasurership Committee considers that the requirement of the Statement of Standard Accounting Practice No 12 that freehold and leasehold buildings should be depreciated is not appropriate for the Church, because the Church's policy is to ensure that the buildings are maintained to such a standard that depreciation is negligible. Properties shown in Note 5 at £2.66 million are insured for £6.65 million.

(ii) Cars, furniture and equipment

Depreciation is provided on cars, furniture and equipment so as to write off the relevant assets over their expected useful lives at the following rates per annum:-

8. Investments

Investments held for the United Reformed Church Ministers Pension Fund, the Common Investment Fund, and the Investment Pool, are stated at market value.

Investments held by other funds are stated at cost. Units held in the Common Investment Fund and the Investment Pool are stated in the accounts of the investing funds at the cost of the units to those funds. The cost is based on quarterly market valuation of the underlying listed investments at the time of purchase. No account is taken of the excess of unrealised gains over unrealised losses in specific investments, having regard to the long term purpose of the investment funds.

Income from investments, including associated the tax credit, has been included to the extent that it was received during the year.

9. United Reformed Church Ministers Pension Fund

The full accounts of the United Reformed Church Ministers Pension Fund, an extract from which is shown on page 26, deal with the resources at the disposal of the trustees and short-term liabilities. Long-term liabilities for pensions and other benefits, which are expected to arise in the future, are not reflected in the accounts. The long-term financial position of the fund is dealt with in the actuarial report. A copy of the full accounts of the United Reformed Church Ministers Pension Fund may be obtained from the Central office of the Church.

10. Stock

Stock consists of books and materials purchased for resale in the Communication and Supplies Section. The stock is stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

11. Westminster College

With the exception of certain building improvements capitalised in between 1983 and 1989, and a house bequeathed to the college in 1986 the buildings and contents of Westminster College are not included in the Central Funds balance sheet, since the College was originally a gift to the Church, the value of which cannot readily be ascertained. The College buildings are insured for £5.90 million.

A valuation of the pension fund was carried out by the actuaries to the Church as at 31st December 1987. At that time, the actuaries reported that there was an unfunded past service liability of £1.23 million on the fund. On the assumption that payments of £500,000 per annum to 1990 are made from the Maintenance of the Ministry Fund (that committee is resolved to make these payments) and payments of £15,000 per annum to 1990 are made from the Retired Ministers Aid Fund, the actuaries have reported that this deficit will be cleared. A further valuation of the pension fund will be carried out by the actuaries as at 31st December 1990. Assembly 1989 agreed to improve the benefits of certain classes of pensioner. The Maintenance of the Ministry Committee is proposing to continue the payment £500,000 per annum until 2000, to allow for these improvements.

ACCOUNTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST DECEMBER 1990

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In presenting the Central Fund Accounts for the year ended 31st December 1990, I would draw your attention to the following points;-

The central funds have increased by £4 million over the year and now stand at £15.1 million.

The significant features of this are

- a) that a 'paper' profit of £2.5 million arose through thre realisation of the Common Investment Fund. This was required to be re-invested in the Investment Pool in order to retain the same flow of income.
 - Similarly, with changes in actual properties held, the gains of £591,000 were re-invested in the higher costs of new properties.
- b) that we received legacies of £277,000 to the central funds, a further £187,000 to the Retired Ministers Housing Society, and £1.1 million to the Retired Ministers Fund.
- c) that General Fund Income exceeded Expenditure by £133,000. It should be noted that this was due in main to the higher levels of interest rates throughout 1990, and that interest rates are now falling sharply, whereas the expenditure continues to increase substantially year by year.
- d) that the appeal for Ministerial Training yielded £400,000 in the year making £474,000 in the period of the appeal (from Assembly 1989 to Assembly 1990). We continue to be grateful for the support given for the central activities of the Church.

Retired Ministers Housing.

We are grateful for the continued support of legacies and gifts for the provision of homes. The total number of houses increased by 10 during the year, partly financed by this and income from the Memorial Hall Trust

Pensions.

The increases in stipend levels being proposed over the next few years have a significant impact on the Pension Fund, but this has not been quantified at the date of this report.

ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1. Scope

These accounts comprise those funds administered in the central office of the United Reformed Church on behalf of United Reformed Church Trust or the United Reformed Church Retired Ministers Housing Society Limited. They do not therefore include funds administered by Provincial and other officers.

2. Basis of preparation.

The accounts, which should be read in conjunction with the report of the Finance Department to Assembly 1991, have been prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified by the inclusion of investments at market value in the Investment Pool on page 22, and the United Reformed Church Ministers Pension Fund on page 24. These accounts are also prepared in accordance with the Accounting Standards Committee Statement of Recommended Practice, No. 2, - 'Accounting by Charities' and comply with this in all material respects.

3. Classification of funds

The capital accounts are permanent endowment accounts. The General Fund is for the "furthering the religious and other charitable work of the United Reformed Church". All other funds are more particularly restricted, as indicated by the respective fund titles.

4. Income.

Contributions to the Unified Appeal and to the Maintenance of the Ministry Fund are brought into account on a receipts basis, with the inclusion of receipts in the early part of 1991 relating to 1990. However, where a Province had remitted more than the agreed contribution to the Maintenance of the Ministry Fund by 31st December 1990, the excess is being carried forward as an advance payment on account of the contribution for 1991. Legacies are credited on a receipts basis to the fund designated by the donor or to the General Fund if no fund is designated.

5. Depreciation

Property

No provision for depreciation is made on freehold or leasehold buildings. The Financial Resources Committee considers that the requirement of the Statement of Standard Accounting Practice No 12 that freehold and leasehold buildings should be depreciated is not appropriate for the Church, because the Church's policy is to ensure that the buildings are maintained to such a standard that depreciation is negligible. Properties shown in Note 5 at £3.59 million are insured for £8.59 million.

Cars, furniture and equipment

Depreciation is provided on cars, furniture and equipment so as to write off the relevant assets over their expected useful lives at the following rates per annum:-

Cars	30% on cost
Major Equipment	
Computers	25% on cost
Printing Machinery	20% on cost
Other furniture and equipment	10% on cost

Investments

Investments held for the United Reformed Church Ministers Pension Fund and the Investment Pool, are stated at market value.

Investments held for other funds are stated at cost. Units held in the Investment Pool are stated in the accounts of the investing funds at the cost of the units to those funds. The cost is based on quarterly market valuation of the underlying listed investments at the time of purchase. No account is taken of the excess of unrealised gains over unrealised losses in specific investments, having regard to the long term purpose of the investment funds.

Income from investments, including the associated tax credit, has been included to the extent that it was received during the year.

7. Stock

Stock consists of books and materials purchased for resale in the Communication and Supplies Section. The stock is stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

8. Westminster College

With the exception of certain improvements, bequests and purchases between 1983 and 1990, the buildings and contents of Westminster College are not included in the Central Funds balance sheet, since the College was originally a gift to the Church, the value of which cannot readily be ascertained. The College buildings are insured for £9.80 million.

9. United Reformed Church Ministers Pension Fund

The full accounts of the United Reformed Church Ministers Pension Fund, an extract from which is shown on page 24, deal with the resources at the disposal of the trustees and short-term liabilities. Long-term liabilities for pensions and other benefits, which are expected to arise in the future, are not reflected in the accounts. The long-term financial position of the fund is dealt with in the actuarial report. A copy of the full accounts of the United Reformed Church Ministers Pension Fund may be obtained from the Central office of the Church.

The contributing members of the fund are not contracted out of the State Pension Scheme.

NOTE 10 - COMMITMENTS

At 31st December 1989 and 31st December 1990 no contracts had been placed for the purchase of property for the Central Funds of the Church. The United Reformed Church Retired Ministers Housing Society Ltd had contracted to purchase two properties at 31st December 1990, at the cost of £121,000 (1989 nil).

The Retired Ministers Housing Society has given approval for the purchase of property to the value of £270,000 (1989 £143,000). These acquisitions will be funded from the unexpended income of the Church or from the proceeds of properties currently unoccupied and for sale. From its General Fund the Church has agreed to lend to the URC Retired Ministers Housing Society Limited any shortfall.

The Officers of the Church Buildings Fund have authorised loans amounting to £74,000 (1989 £218,000) which were not paid at 31st December 1990.

A valuation of the pension fund was carried out by the actuaries to the Church as at 31st December 1987 At that time, the actuaries reported that there was an unfunded past service liability of £1.23 million. Since 1987 the Maintenance of the Ministry Fund and the Retired Ministers Aid Fund have made contributions to the Pension Fund of £500,000 and £15,000 pa respectively. The Assembly, in 1989 agreed to improve the benefits of certain classes of pensioner, which created liabilities on the fund in respect of past service, and the Maintenance of the Ministry Committee has proposed that it will continue the payment of £500,000 pa until 2000 to pay for these benefits.

The proposals currently to be considered by Assembly will have a considerable effect on the funding of the Pension Fund. The trustees cannot quantify the cost of these proposals at the current time.

The actuarial valuation of the fund as at 31st December 1990 is currently in hand, and the funding and provisions of the Pension Fund will be reviewed in the light thereof.

Accounting policy 9 on page 5 forms an integral part of the accounts of this fund
