Get to know your Bible

The Bible is like a library made up of 66 books written by many different people over many years.

The Old Testament books were written before Jesus was born. They are the holy stories he would have grown up hearing and reading. There are 39 of these.

The New Testament tells us the stories of Jesus and his followers. There are 27 books in the


New Testament.

Bible context: 2 Chronicles

The two books called Chronicles were originally one book but were split into two when the Christian Bible was made. They tell the history of the relationship between God and God's people over many years and draw together stories from some of the other history books in the Old Testament. Nobody knows who wrote them and it might be a number of different writers, writing at different times.

The Story: 2 Chronicles 2 verses 1, 5 to 9 (from The International Children's Bible)

Solomon decided to build a temple as a place to worship the Lord. He also decided to build a palace for himself....

"The temple I build will be great. This is because our God is greater than all gods. But no one can really build a house for our God. Not even the highest of heavens can hold God. How then can I build a temple for him? I can only build a place to burn sacrifices to God.

Now send me a man skilled in working with gold, silver, bronze and iron. He must know how to work with purple, red and blue thread. He must know how to make engravings. He will work with my skilled craftsmen in Judah and Jerusalem. These are the men my father David chose.

Also send me cedar, pine and juniper logs from Lebanon. I know your servants are experienced at cutting down the trees in Lebanon. My servants will help them. Send me a lot of wood. The temple I am going to build will be large and wonderful.

Ideas to Retell/Explore the Story

It was Nanna Birch's birthday and Tasha and Joshua were in a grump. They looked at each other and shrugged the biggest shrug and sighed the biggest sigh.

It wasn't that they didn't love Nanna Birch – in fact, the opposite was quite true. She was such a special person. She wasn't their real nanna, of course, but everyone in their street called her Nanna Birch because she felt a bit like she was everybody's Nanna. She lived in the little house with the blue door, right in the middle of the street, and it was as though the heart of the street was right there. She knew everybody by name and just everybody knew Nanna Birch. But that meant that everyone in the whole street would be doing something for Nanna's birthday and Tasha and Joshua just didn't know what to do.

"Whatever we do," Tasha said, "has got to be extra special. She's such a special person."

"Yes," agreed Joshua, "she always remembers our birthdays and special days, and she always helps us if we're worried or upset or hurt. Remember when I fell off my bike and she put a plaster on my leg and helped me get home again? She even slipped a chocolate in my pocket without me noticing. We must do something special, but what can we do that's special enough?"





"You're right", Tasha replied, "Remember when I got locked out of the house when Dad had gone shopping and she took me in and made me hot chocolate and let me help her bake biscuits for the church coffee morning until Dad got home? And when she helped you with your fractions homework and explained it so clearly that you got 10 out of 10? And how Mum always goes to visit her if she's feeling a bit stressed and comes home looking calm and relaxed?"

"I've got it," shouted Josh, leaping to his feet. "Let's bake her a cake. Everyone likes a cake for their birthday!" Tasha wasn't so sure this was a good idea, but she found a recipe in her mum's recipe book and together they gathered together the ingredients. They weighed and they measured, they stirred and they baked.... They opened up the oven door and.....oh no! The cake hadn't risen at all and had definitely overcooked. In fact, it looked more like a COWPAT than a birthday cake!!!!

"Oh no!" exclaimed Tasha, "we can't give her that!"

Hmmm... it seemed they weren't going to win the Great British Bake Off any time soon. So what else could they do?

"I've got it," shouted Tasha. "Remember we planted some seeds in the garden this spring? Why don't we dig up one of our plants and put it in a plantpot to give her?" Grabbing a spade, they ran out into the garden to the little patch of ground Dad had set apart for them.

"Oh no!" exclaimed Josh. "I think we must have forgotten to water them. They look more like straw than sunflowers! The only things that are growing well are the weeds. We can't give her weeds!"

With a sigh, the children decided to pool their pocket money and buy her a present instead. Maybe some lovely jewellery as she always spent her money on others and never seemed to buy anything shiny for herself. But even when they searched through their pockets and the bottom of their school bags, they found only a few coins. 47p probably wasn't going to be enough to buy a nice shiny necklace for their special friend. It wouldn't even buy one of those beautiful fancy birthday cards that play a tune when you open them.





There was nothing for it, they would just have to do what they usually did. They looked at each other, shrugged the biggest shrug and sighed the biggest sigh, then grabbed their pencil cases and some paper and started to make a birthday card each. Nanna Birch loved flowers, so Josh drew a garden of flowers of all different shapes and colours. And Tasha had noticed that Nanna Birch had lots of hippo ornaments and thought that maybe her special friend had a soft spot for that particular animal, so she found a picture of a hippo and very carefully copied it onto the paper. And when the cards were finished, they set off round to Nanna Birch's house, where all the neighbours were gathered.

On the table were gifts and presents from everyone. There was a fantastic cake with candle in the shape of an eight and a zero; there were cards of all shapes and sizes including several that played a tune when they were opened; there were bunches of flowers of every colour under the sun and a brand new jewellery box with a shiny necklace in it. Everyone wanted to help Nanna Birch celebrate her eightieth birthday with a special special gift.

Table Top Discussions

- Why do you think we don't tend to build temples for God to live in these days?
- How do you like to show people how special they are to you? How do they show you that you are special too?

What treasures can you find to put in the box for your little ones to explore?


Perhaps older children could help find the things.

Building bricks or duplo/lego








Shiny and sparkly things – jewellery, shiny card or foil, gems

Pray Together

Precious Gems

You will need: Something to represent precious gemstones

(wrap small stones or buttons in silver foil or use marbles or glass beads)

A small box covered in shiny paper for a treasure box.



Take your precious gems and place them in the treasure box. Take one out at a time and hold it in the palm of your hand.

Think about the most precious gift or gifts you have been given. Say thank you to God.

Think about the people who are precious to you or who have helped you. Take one gem for each person. As you hold the gem, say their name and thank God for them.

Take another gem and think about people who need help. Ask God to bless them and show you how you can help them.

Return your gems to your treasure box and use it to help you pray. You could continue to add prayers or different treasure to the box.

Spiral Prayers





Build a spiral using bricks, or you could use counters or buttons or something similar. Place one brick in the centre to represent God.

Decide on the people places and situations you want to talk to God about and walk your finger around the spiral as you think, bringing all those things to God. When you reach the centre, take some time to pause and talk to God. Slowly work your way back to the end of the spiral, listening to what God might be saying to you, and then say Amen.

A prayer you can say when you reach the middle of the spiral:

We are precious to God who knows and loves us. God, we praise you for your love and care.

God is with us, and promises never to leave or abandon us. God, we praise you for your love and care.

God is with us in the good and the bad, and will help us in times of need. God, we praise you for your love and care.

God is faithful, and overcomes our fears with hope. God, we praise you for your love and care. Amen.





Pray Together

Wood Prayers

You will need: A piece of rough wood (not splintery, though)

Sandpaper Cooking oil



Pick up your piece of wood and carefully run it across your hand. Notice the texture, feel any rough edges, and look at the grain. With some sandpaper, smooth the rough edges on the wood. As you do this, think about things you would like God to help you with that might be difficult. Ask God to smooth away any rough edge that you might have.

Think about the situations in the world that are difficult and challenging and ask God to be in those situations. As you smooth the wood, ask God to bring peace.

When you have smoothed the wood, take some oil and rub it gently into the wood. I wonder, how does that change the wood? Does the grain become clearer? Ask God to help you to shine and show your gifts.







Just your God-given skills and talents — everybody has these!







Special Gift Pots


You will need:

Salt dough ingredients:

- ½ cup of flour
- ¼ cup of salt
- ¼ cup of water
- Glitter and food colouring

What you do:

Mix all the ingredients together to make your salt dough, form it into a little pot and cook in the oven. Cook on a very low heat for 3 hours.



If you want to make a pot in another way, roll up strips of paper and create a coil pot by gluing the coils together and leaving it to dry.

Alternatively, if you have access to needle felting, you might choose to make a felt pot.

Put something special into your pot and give it to someone as a special gift.















Our Walking the Way Challenge this time is...

Everyday Faith:

Solomon wanted to build somewhere extra special to be a place for God to live amongst God's people. We believe that after Jesus lived on earth, he sent the Holy Spirit to be with us always and everywhere – all around us and inside us – which means that God lives in us, no matter where we go. Each morning when you wake, remember that you are extra special because God lives in you. Remember it when you're getting ready for the day, when you're in work or school, when you're relaxing, when you're choosing what to eat, when you're playing, when you're doing your homework or tidying the house.

Scrapbooking:

Why not design your own special place for God – maybe a place where you might go to talk to or to worship God, maybe your own church or temple. Think carefully about what's important to you, what is this place for, what do you know about God and God's people? You could draw or paint or collage, or even build and take a photo for your scrapbook.
