When Jesus went back to heaven, he didn't leave the disciples alone. He promised to send them the Holy Spirit to be their helper always. The Spirit came like a wind and a flame to fill them with confidence and faith in God. Why not make some microwave meringues and watch the heat and air help them grow.

You will need 300g icing sugar and 1 lightly beaten egg white (don't waste the yolk – you could add it to an omelette!)

Sift the icing sugar into the egg white and mix in carefully until it makes a solid ball of icing that you can split with a spoon. Divide it into 6 lumps of icing and roll each lump into a ball.

Put some baking paper on a plate and sit three balls of icing on it, well spread out. Microwave them on high for about one and a half minutes and watch how they expand and grow.

Once they're cool, you can eat them as they are or you can sandwich them with some whipped cream and some fruit.
