Psalm 72:10-11 - gifts from afar

Theme: People from all over the world are part of God's story

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Introduction: What would be helpful to know before we begin?

"We three kings of Orient are"... What picture does that phrase conjure up? Three wealthy men on camels silhouetted against a desert sky? An image beloved of Christmas cards for many years. In truth, they were probably greater in number, riding horses, and had servants with them, but let's not allow fact to get in the way of F.A.Y.R.

You'd be right in thinking that the 'three kings' (or the three Magi, or the three wise men) don't turn up in the Christmas story until after Jesus has been born – so why are we focussing on them in Advent?

We don't know exactly who they were – although we've given them names – Caspar, Melchior and Balthasar. We don't know exactly what they were - Matthew's gospel called them 'Magi' – astrologers or Seers – the idea that they were Kings came later. We don't even know that there were three of them – we just assume that, because there were three gifts, there were three gifters! But they certainly belong in Advent because, although they didn't turn up until after Jesus was born, their journey, just like our Advent journey, started a long time before. They had to prepare. They realised that something important was happening when they first saw the star. And they wanted to be part of whatever it was – they could have sent a messenger or a servant, but they travelled in person to Bethlehem.

We've looked at how the birth of the Christ-child meant that the shepherds, often seen as the 'least' or 'poorest' in 1st century society had a part to play in God's story, the inclusion of these,

the 'most' or 'richest' in society, shows us that God's story is for everyone – and everyone has a role to play. In the same way, the shepherds were local people, in the fields near Bethlehem, while these travellers, just as in the psalm we are reading, were from distant lands and cultures.

After meeting Jesus and his family, they 'returned a different way'. We are given an explanation for this; they wanted to avoid King Herod, but it's also true to say that, having met Jesus, things changed. And maybe that is the same for all of us today. When we get to know Jesus Christ, things can never be the same.

Together

Let's start our time with God and each other well

If used in a mixed-age group, then young people can support younger ones in using the gathering prayer in Faith Adventures: Children Together. If used in a youth group, you could use this opening prayer or encourage young people to open the session with a prayer of their own.

All mighty God,

Be with us as we learn more about you through stories and people in the Bible.

Help us to walk in your way and follow your path.

Be with us as we make decisions that affect our lives, and the lives of those around us.

In-person game – One King came from......

This game requires memory and good listening skills.

Sitting in a circle one person starts by saying, one King came fromand completes the sentence with a country and then something that originates from that country. So for instance......One King came from China and bought a wok, the next person repeats the first persons sentence but then adds to it with a different country and item that country is known for. So for instance...... One King came from China and bought a wok, one King came from Manchester and bought a football kit. This continues round the circle until someone can't remember and it starts all over again with that person. I wonder how far you can get!

Explore

Ideas and activities to explore this week's Bible passage together

A new way to explore the theme

You may wish to use the explore section from this week's Faith Adventures: Children Together to guide your exploration of the theme this week.

Alternatively:

The visitors from the East are not always explored fully as part of the Christmas story. This is an opportunity to consider who these people were and what cultures they were from. It is also an opportunity to consider how cultures around the world relate to this part of the story as part of the Epiphany celebrations.

In all countries around the world we have our own interpretations of the nativity scene, reflecting who we are and our own culture. (You could show some examples if you like see nativity scenes from around the world on Google.)

Have you ever wondered who the wise men were? How many were there? Where did they come from? What did they look like? What did they sound like?

Talking together: Going deeper

- I wonder who the wise people are today?
- I wonder if the wise men/kings travelled together or whether they met up there?
- How long might it have taken them to get there and what sort of things might have happened on the way?

- Why didn't they just send a messenger with the gifts?
- I wonder if they had servants travelling with them?
- What gifts might the others have brought if there were more than three kings?
- Do you think anyone else brought them gifts?
- Where did the kings/wise men go afterwards and what did they do?

Express

How do we respond to what we've discussed and express our faith personally?

Praying together

Prayer Respond to the theme by writing or saying a short prayer. Alternatively use the creative prayer from Faith Adventures: Children Together for this session, or use the prayer activity below.

Alternatively light a candle and play some music while you listen and talk to God together.

You will need an advent wreath with four candles: this can be as simple as you like. Each week of Advent we will add a prayer for each of the candles.

Candle 3 – The wise men

Dear God,
This candle we light
is for the wise men
who travelled in faith and hope
following the star.
Help us to bring our gifts to the Christ Child
With faith and hope in our hearts.
As we journey with the wise ones,
in this time of waiting and getting ready,
may our hope shine bright.

What you need:


- Good quality paper or canvas board
