Genesis 16:1-16 The story of Hagar

Theme: The story of the woman who named God.

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Introduction: What would be helpful to know before we begin?

This week we are looking at the story of Hagar – an oft forgotten woman in the Bible (not to be confused with Hagar the Horrible – a comic strip Viking!).

In the translation we have suggested you use, Hagar is described as Sarai's 'maid'. Other translations refer to her as Sarai's servant or slave. You might find it useful to look at alternative translations to get a more rounded understanding of Hagar's position in Abram and Sarai's household. Nowadays we would not use the term 'slave' but, rather say that she was 'enslaved'. Slavery is something that is done to another person – it doesn't describe them.

There is a lot in this passage – Sarai treats Hagar as a possession and gifts her body to Abram in order that Abram might have a better chance of having a child. There is no consent from Hagar. Once she becomes pregnant with Abram's child, Hagar begins to treat Sarai differently – and not in a good way. Hagar runs away from Sarai, who is mistreating her, into the desert.

Be aware of various potential triggers in this story – domestic abuse, bullying, but also issues potentially arising around step-parents and infidelity. These will all need to be dealt with sensitively.

In the desert, God uses and angel to talk to Sarai – God tells her to return to Sarai and put up with her abuse. This is not suggesting that children, or parents, should 'suffer in silence'. Affirm this point to your group and refer to your church's safeguarding policy. God tells Sarai to name her child 'Ishmael' – translated as 'God hears' – and Hagar realises that God has seen her, and she has seen God.



If you used last week's session you might like to draw parallels between the two stories – God's angels, places being given names because there was an encounter with God. You might also like to explore God giving children names – and make the link with the angel telling Mary to call her baby 'Jesus' (Luke 1.26-38).

Together

Let's start our time with God and each other well

If used in a mixed-age group, then young people can support younger ones in using the gathering prayer in Faith Adventures: Children Together. If used in a youth group, you could use this opening prayer or encourage young people to open the session with a prayer of their own.

All mighty God,

Be with us as we learn more about you through stories and people in the Bible.

Help us to walk in your way and follow your path.

Be with us as we make decisions that affect our lives, and the lives of those around us.

- How does it feel to know that God sees you?
- What do all the characters in the video tell you about how God sees us?

Explore

Ideas and activities to explore this week's Bible passage together

A new way to explore the theme

You may wish to use the explore section from this week's Faith Adventures: Children Together to guide your exploration of the theme this week.

Modern parables

This section includes references to TV programmes, films, books, TED talks, TikTok etc aimed at this age group that will have been widely seen, or where a clip is available to use as a stimulus for discussion. You may also enjoy the picture book recommended for Faith Adventures: Children Together and explore the relevance of the story to the theme of the session in more depth – young people and adults are often well tuned in to the deeper meanings in materials aimed at younger people and the authors are often very aware of the adults reading the books to or with younger ones.

If you have time you could briefly discuss initial thoughts of this video and what it means for our lives today.

Talking together: Going deeper

 Has there been a time when you have felt you are lost or in the wilderness like Hagar – have you been seen by God?





- What name would you give God and what name would God give you?
- When have you been seen but wanted to be invisible? When have you been invisible but wanted to be seen?

Conversation starters

- I wonder why God sent Hagar back?
- I wonder if you know what your name means? What would you call yourself if you could choose a different name?
- I wonder how Sarai felt when Hagar got pregnant?
- I wonder whether Hagar felt God before God visited her as an angel?

Express

How do we respond to what we've discussed and express our faith personally?

Praying together

Prayer Respond to the theme by writing or saying a short prayer. Alternatively use the creative prayer from Faith Adventures: Children Together for this session, or use the prayer activity below.

Alternatively light a candle and play some music while you listen and talk to God together.

Responding together

This is an opportunity for a social justice challenge, some research, craftivism, or a craft or STEM activity. You may have a specific activity chosen but free choice is also an option. Here are some suggestions for this week's theme. See Faith Adventures: Children Together for a craft and a STEM activity which may also be appropriate. Choose whatever will work best for your group.

SWAN campaign – #StartsWithaName

The #startswithaname campaign is an inclusion and belonging initiative that encourages people to share the phonetic spellings of their names. It is hoped that this will help people to feel welcome. Spend some time coming up with phonetic versions of your name and create a





card to show this. You could use emojis, rhyming words, celebrities, famous places to make your pronunciation as memorable as possible for others.

For example the name Tom Hackett could be presented as Tom (sounds like bomb) Hack-it
