Exodus 2: 1-10 - Moses in the bulrushes

Theme: Celebrating different kinds of caring

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Introduction: What would be helpful to know before we begin?

This passage from Exodus does not set the context so you may need to explore the context a little. The Israelites – the descendents of Joseph and his family – had become slaves in Egypt but were increasing in number and posing a threat to the Egyptians, so Pharaoh issued a decree that every new baby boy born to an Israelite family should be killed to stop the population growing. So baby Moses was at risk – even after the Egyptian Princess found him!

This session is orginally written to be used on Mothering Sunday, or Mothers day. It is important to remember that you can never be 100% certain of the life experiences of others and unexpected things can be triggers. People of any age who have experienced neglect or abuse, abandonment or bereavement, even refugee children who were sent abroad unacommpained may struggle at times with this session. Creating a separate quiet space for someone to go to when feeling this way may be of benefit as well as explaining before the session begins that it is ok to listen and not participate in all areas of the session. The focus of this session is on 'mothering' rather than specifically on mothers. Even the story of Moses has the role fulfilled by birth mother, adoptive mother and a sibling.

What is mothering? What kind of people are we celebrating? Mothering involves guiding you through life, caring about you, protecting you, helping you grow. It can be done (or not done) by fathers and siblings, grandparents, other relatives, foster parents, adoptive parents, friends, godparents, sometimes even strangers. The church through it's congregation should guide us, care for us, protect us and help us to grow too. You may want to think about some ways in which your church does this.





Exodus means 'going out' in Latin. Moses grew up to lead the Israelites out of slavery and oppression in Egypt. God sends a series of plagues to convince Pharoah to let the people leave Egypt with Moses and this event is what jewish people remember when they celebrate Pesach or Passover, the meal which Jesus was sharing with his disciples at the Last Supper. You may wish to refer back to this if you use the session about the Last Supper in March week 4.

Together

Let's start our time with God and each other well

If used in a mixed-age group, then young people can support younger ones in using the gathering prayer in Faith Adventures: Children Together. If used in a youth group, you could use this opening prayer or encourage young people to open the session with a prayer of their own.

All mighty God,

Be with us as we learn more about you through stories and people in the Bible.

Help us to walk in your way and follow your path.

Be with us as we make decisions that affect our lives, and the lives of those around us.

In-person game

See this week's Faith Adventures: Children Together for suitable games for this theme

Alternative game: Drainpipe

Gather some empty wrapping paper tubes and cut them in half, length ways. One person is to roll a table tennis ball down the first tube, the next tube needs to be brought next to the first tube and so on to make a path of tubes for thr ball to roll along. See how long pewople can keep the ball rolling along the tubes. If it falls down, start agin!

Questions for discussion

- What sort of caring do you think of when listening to the song by Ella Henderson?

Explore

Ideas and activities to explore this week's Bible passage together

A new way to explore the theme

You may wish to use the explore section from this week's Faith Adventures: Children Together to guide your exploration of the theme this week.

Alternatively:

Think about different mothering roles and what they might require. What might a job description look like if for a mum, a carer, a sibling, etc? Take some time to think about what that role might involve. Does the age of the person being cared for make a difference to what roles that person may take on? What different skills do those in mothering roles need? Plan and write a job description.

There is a template at the back of this session to get you started.

Modern parables

This section includes references to TV programmes, films, books, TED talks, TikTok etc aimed at this age group that will have been widely seen, or where a clip is available to use as a stimulus for discussion. You may also enjoy the picture book recommended for Faith Adventures: Children Together and explore the relevance of the story to the theme of the session in more depth – young people and adults are often well tuned in to the deeper meanings in materials aimed at younger people and the authors are often very aware of the adults reading the books to or with younger ones.

A helpful film to suggest watching (outside of the group session)on the subject of caring, is Blind Side staring Sandra Bullock.

Questions to think about.

- Other than family members, are there other people who look after us?
- Who do you feel comfortable talking to when things are difficult?
- Are there different ways to look after someone?
- There is a well known proverb: 'It takes a village to raise a child' What do you think it means?





Talking together: Going deeper

- I wonder if the father had any say in what happened with \Moses?
- I wonder why the pharaoh's daughter might have chosen to adopt the baby and why she wanted someone else's to look after it?
- I wonder whether the family expected the baby to be found?

Express

How do we respond to what we've discussed and express our faith personally?

Praying together

Prayer Respond to the theme by writing or saying a short prayer. Alternatively use the creative prayer from Faith Adventures: Children Together for this session, or use the prayer activity below

Alternatively light a candle and play some music while you listen and talk to God together.

Spoken Prayer - based on the prayer attributed to St Teresa of Avila "Christ has no body but yours"

Christ, help us to remember that you have no body but ours;

No hands, no feet on earth but ours.

Help us remember that ours are the eyes with which you look compassion on this world;

That ours are the feet with which you walk to do good;

That ours are the hands with which you bless all the world.

We are your hands and feet, your eyes and your body.

You have no body now on earth, but we can play that part,

Working together to do your will.

Help us and encourage us, teach us and lead us as your body here on earth.

Amen.

Responding together

This is an opportunity for a social justice challenge, some research, craftivism, or a craft or STEM activity, You may have a specific activity chosen but free choice is also an option.
