
Outgoing Moderator: Philippa Osei

Updates on resolutions and discussions from 2023 were shared:

- Disability Awareness task group developing conversation starters for churches to use, which will be available on the URC Education and Learning Hub later this year
- Quiet Spaces task group worked with Alex Clare Young to create guidance on URC website: www.urc.org.uk/your-church/family-friendly-church/
- Support for those affected by substance misuse and mental health awareness led to the creation of a poster for churches to download: www.bit.ly/48d1ixN
- Equalities and Diversity Representatives now sit on URC Equalities Committee
- Gender and Sexual Identity Discrimination task group has established good working relationships with Open Table Network, Inclusive Church, One Body One Faith, Switchboard, Stonewall and The Proud Trust to create a resource which will go on the URC website later this year
- URC Youth helped shape the resolution passed at General Assembly 2023 affirming the human dignity of transgender, non-binary and gender non-conforming people
- URC Youth worked with Mission Committee on the resolution passed at General Assembly 2023 endorsing measures for ecumenical working and resource sharing
- Youth Assembly was reminded that they now have the ability to nominate candidates for the role of General Assembly Moderator.

URC Youth Review

Youth Assembly 2022 required the Youth Executive to form a task group to review the running of the Youth Executive as well as the wider URC Youth,



including racial diversity. This group was to comprise six to eight people, including a chair who was not to be a member of the URC Youth, to report back to URC Youth Assembly with their findings.

Thanks were expressed to Fran Kissack (chair) and the review group for all their work. The Review findings and recommendations were shared:

- Consider having more motions submitted in advance
- Suggest having workshops that inform debate, and having ways to explore issues outside of formal debates
- Consider whether other events are needed for URC Youth
- Consider if the role of Youth Moderator has become too big
- Suggest developing support for members of Youth Executive
- Suggest having clearer expectations of Synod Youth Representatives
- Suggest involving those outside Youth Executive more in working groups
- Recognise that racial diversity in roles is a denomination-wide issue rather than specifically URC Youth issue, and note progress made in this regard.

The Youth Executive have already taken the following steps:

- In conversation with other denominations about another youth event
- Rewritten the guidance for Synod Youth Representatives

URC Youth Assembly 2024 Resolutions

URC Youth Assembly encourages local churches to engage with Student Christian Movement's Honest Church campaign.

Proposer – Heather Moore (Southern Synod) Seconder – Daniel Raddings (Yorkshire Synod)

This motion was passed by consensus.

Youth Assembly encourages General Assembly to request that the Mission Committee investigates and develops further connections and collaborations with just peace-focused organisations and Churches in Occupied Palestine and Israel.

In addition the URC encourages churches to educate congregations.

Proposer – Philippa Osei (Thames North Synod) Seconder – Jo Harris (National Synod of Wales)

This motion was passed by consensus.

URC Youth Assembly instructs Youth
Executive to work with Children and Youth

Work Committee to look at the roles and responsibilities of the URC Youth Assembly Moderator, and the potential for making this a paid role.

URC Youth Assembly also instructs Youth Executive to work with Children and Youth Work Committee to look at the roles and responsibilities of the Youth Executive.

URC Youth Assembly requests feedback from Youth Executive at Youth Assembly 2025 with their findings.

Proposer – Reuben Watt (West Midlands Synod) Seconder – Brandon Stein (Eastern Synod)
