Rainbow Prayer

Equipment – paper, coloured pens or paints

The Bible often uses symbols to represent hope. One of these is the rainbow. Draw or paint a rainbow using the seven colours.


As you colour each of the bands say a prayer:

- Red = Rebuilding. Pray for those who have lost their homes, communities and livelihoods due to conflicts, wars, occupations, climate and natural disasters. Pray for those who need to return and to rebuild their homes and lives. Pray for free access to materials, finances, and resources to aid with this process.
- Orange = Obstacles. Pray that all obstacles are removed from stopping people living together in harmony political, financial, and practical obstacles.
- Yellow = Young People. Pray for all young people and children who have seen too much destruction and sadness.

 May they know God's love and peace, and the hope that things will get better.
- Green = Giving of Aid. Protect the gifts of aid (food, water, building, medical, and school supplies) being sent from other nations that they will safely reach those in need.
- Blue = Broken. Pray for those who are hungry or left injured and disabled by war. Pray for those who have lost loved ones.
- Indigo = Inspiration. Pray that nations will be inspired to find ways to work together for peace and justice. Pray that God's kingdom of love and peace will come very, very soon.
- Violet = Violence. Pray for an end to wars, genocide, starvation, thirst, lawlessness, and racism. Pray that peace will break out across the whole world.

Isaiah 41:10





We pray that you will guide the fair trade movement in its efforts to secure a fair deal for those whose bargaining power is weakest.


