What songs keep you going when things get tough?

A team anthem? A hit from your youth? A workout track? A favourite hymn?

At Greenbelt Festival this year, we want to inspire the thousands of people who come into our venue, The Table, by hanging up lots of cut-out musical notes that have the titles or key lyrics of your 'songs that keep you going' written on them. We'll also make a playlist from these songs for everyone to hear.

You will need:

- 2x A4 pages for the front and back of your 'note'
- some thin cardboard about the same size (a large cereal packet is perfect)
- a gluestick
- colouring pens, coloured paper, wrapping paper, feathers, pasta, paint, fabric, ink stamps, stickers or other crafty items
- a large envelope and a postage stamp.

Method:

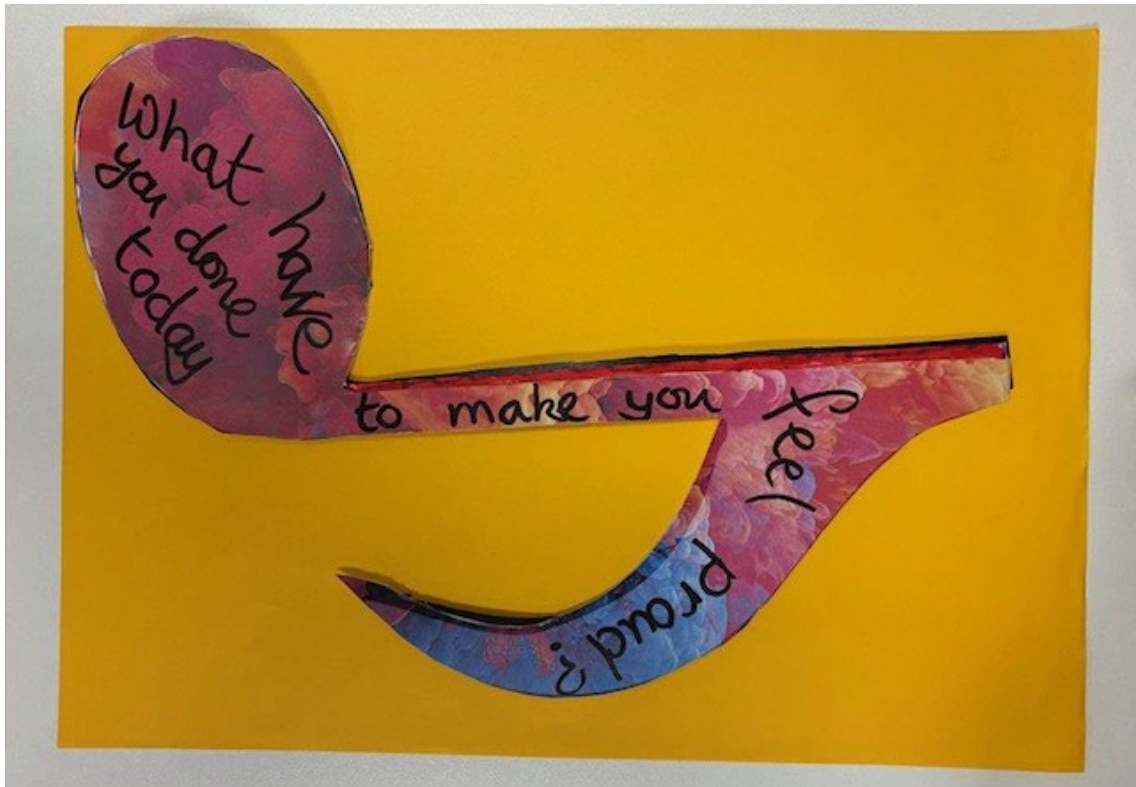
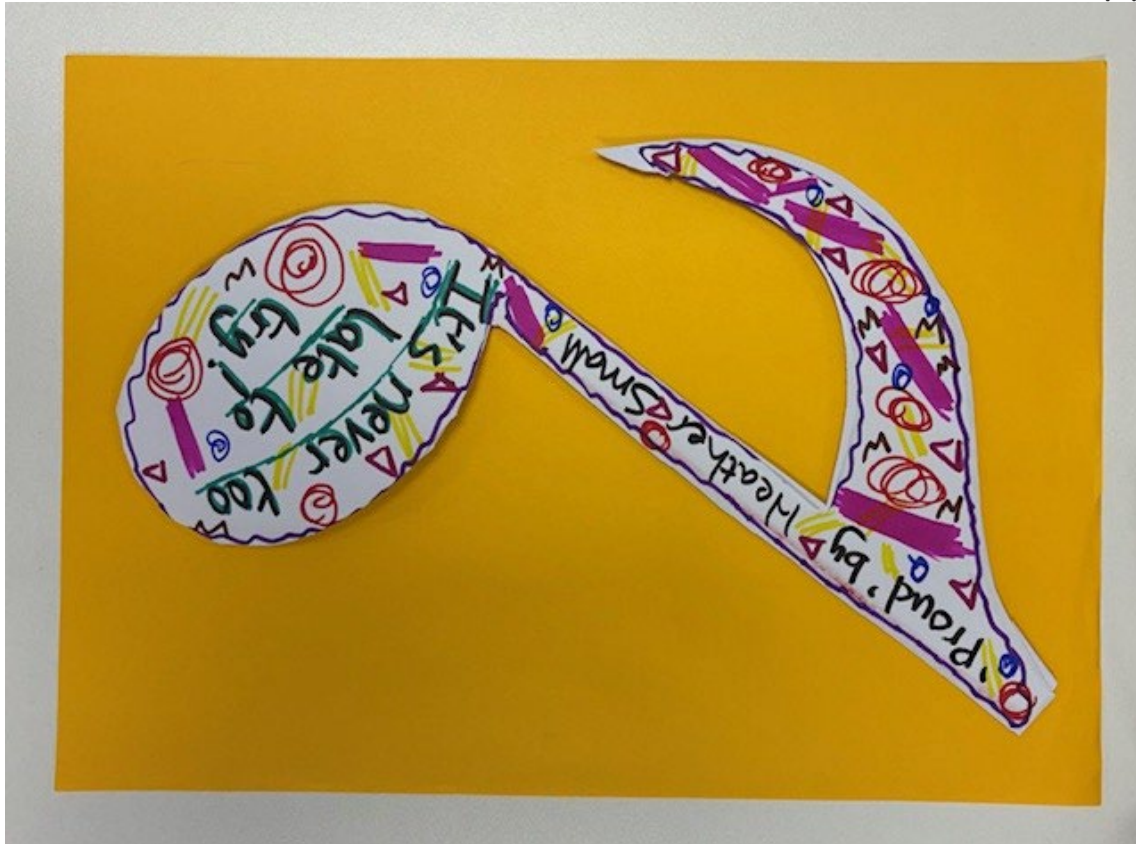
1. Print out the front and back of the note [here](#) (or design your own). Make sure they are about the height of an A4 page – about 30cm (12 inches)
2. Inside one of the note shapes, write in large, thick letters the title (and maybe the band/singer) of your 'song that keeps you going'.
3. Inside the other note shape, write in large, thick letters a lyric from the song that is important to you.
4. Decorate your note shapes your craft materials.
5. Stick one of the shapes to your thin cardboard.
6. Cut around the note outline.
7. Cut out the other note shape and stick it on the back of the cardboard.
8. Send it to us at the address below. You can gather lots of 'notes' from your family, friends, groups or church and post them all in the same package. Please include a message to tell us where you are sending your notes from.
